To celebrate my birthday week, I accessed the Fowlerville District Library's Digital Archives to see what was happening around Fowlerville the week I was born. As we all know, the *Fowlerville News & Views* is published and delivered on the weekend. The Library's archives show that in 1971 the local paper, *The Fowlerville Review* was published and delivered on Wednesday.

According to the old saying; "Wednesday's child is full of woe". The October 13th, 1971 edition of *The Review* reflects woe, with front page headlines like "*Three Die in House Fire*" and "*Anonymous Tip Leads to Arrest, Highland Man Charged With Murder*", "*Four Accidents Marr Weekend*", "*Utter's Robbed Over Weekend*" and "*Milk Gets Fine For Fenton Pair*". My condolences to the families involved; especially the victims of the house fire.

The front-page story about the Utter's robbery was most fascinating. "A neat burgler with good taste broke into Utter's Mens Wear Sunday and walked away with a complete wardrobe, plus spending money" is the lead sentence in this story. It is an attention-grabber! Utter's Men's Wear also had a witty ad; HUNTER'S TRADING POST with a checklist of needed items in preparation for hunting season such as hunting boots, hunting shoes, socks, shirts, gloves, and... advice.

Digging further into the paper, I found many uplifting stories. Fowlerville football games this week in history were wins for the Varsity, Junior Varsity, and Freshman teams! The Varsity and Junior Varsity teams each scored two touchdowns to defeat the Pinckney Pirates. The Freshman team won their first victory of the season with a touchdown beating Perry 8 to 6!

The Howell Theater was showing "Gone With the Wind" through Tuesday and the following week "2001: A Space Odyssey", followed by "Doctor Zhivago". Talk about a blast from the past! I spent many hours watching movies at the Howell Theater.

A fun column called *Round the Town* shared local 'society' news. Items included in the column featured Sunday visitors and dinners, Fowlerville residents' trips; highlighting many fall color tours, family birthday parties, who is currently a patient at McPhearson Hospital, births, and other events held by local community groups like the VFW. This column is like reading a Happy-Gram!

The Fowlerville Lunch Menus is something that I remember reading as a child. I planned which days I brought a lunch and which days I bought hot lunch. Unfortunately, my favorite

school hot lunch, pigs-in-a-blanket, was not served this week. However, the lunch ladies were celebrating Halloween 47 years ago with Red Devil in a bun, Haystacks, Witches Broom sticks, Draped Ghost, and Cat Tails.

Because the Frank's IGA building is now the new Library, I thought it would be fun to add some of the prices of groceries from the 1970's. In October 1971, *It's Happening at IGA* advertised Campbell's Tomato soup for \$.10 a can, a quart of Miracle Whip on sale for \$.49, and Rib Steaks for \$.99 per pound. You saved \$.20 a pound for the following beef roasts: English Cut was \$.69, Round Bone was \$.75, Boneless Chuck was \$.79, Soup Meat was \$.48, and Boneless Stew Beef was only \$.99! Frank's offered FREE coffee and donuts on Fridays and Saturdays.

One week you could even come in to visit the 1971 Homecoming King and Queen, Ritchie Lewis and Sue Bishop, certain hours Friday afternoon and Saturday during the day. Frank's was open late on Fridays until 9pm, and Saturdays until 7pm. This was back in the time before 24-hour shopping and stores being open 7 days a week. It was a much more personalized, interconnected, and seemingly relaxing time back then!



The Rush to Romanticize Wrong

You probably would not be surprised if I told you this article is inspired by another audiobook I am listening to. And indeed, it is! I changed up my listening topics a little by exploring the truth behind the Old West with *Legends and Lies: The Real West*. It was really a nice throwback since I was an avid Wild West fan as a kid. I watched all the old shows like *The Lone Ranger*, *Gunsmoke*, and *Bonanza*, and you could usually find me running around the yard with capgun six-shooters and cowboy boots, chasing down invisible bandits and troublemakers on my invisible horse, Silver.

The scenarios I acted out in my backyard were pretty accurate to those depicted in the old shows: some bad guy with a black hat and neckerchief would cause trouble around the frontier village, and the good guy would find a way to take him down with the praise of the townsfolk. They were usually pretty straightforward tales, but at least they didn't try to glamorize the villains, which was something that was actually more common in real life. As outlined in *The Real West*, many of the villainous characters of the day were romanticized in their own time through the media and word-of-mouth legends.

We see that even today. Many of the most notorious outlaws of the Wild West, such as Billy the Kid, Butch Cassidy, and Jesse James, are often memorialized as heroic and noble figures in our entertainment and western legends. Somewhere along the way, we took a wrong turn in our cultural conscience by deciding bad behavior is somehow an admirable trait. In the Wild West, people admired the perceived daring and glamor of a life of crime, so the famous criminals of the day were lifted up as heroes of the people. Not surprisingly, those who did this were usually far away from the actual 'adventure' itself. They ignored any of the pain and suffering caused by these villains, and they were willing to use whatever justification was needed to give them a pass.

If we are not careful, then we can fall into that trap as well. Wrongdoing can sometimes have a romantic appeal to it, whether regarding western outlaws, noir gangsters, or modern, militant anarchists. We convince ourselves that they are standing up to 'the system,' so they can't really be that bad. Any wrongdoings they are committing must only be aimed at the racketeers and corrupt, right? At least, that's what we say to ourselves, and we turn a blind eye to the malicious harm they are causing to those around them. Whatever the justification, it sets a dangerous precedence. When we justify the glamorization of one wrong, then what is to stop us from accepting other transgressions?

The Old West was a morally ambivalent time for many who lived during that period, and its dramatization makes for interesting entertainment today. But we can also learn from it, and one of its biggest lessons is to not rush into romanticizing wrongdoing. Don't get caught up in the emotions and glamor of villainy in any form. Remember the harm it really causes, and stick by your guns of embracing what is right.



Fowlerville Varsity Football Team loses to St. Johns 45-21 on Oct. 5

The Fowlerville Varsity Football Team lost to St. Johns 45-21 in a CAAC Red Division game played on Oct. 5 at their opponent's field. The win put St. Johns in a three-way tie for the league championship with a 4-1 record. They share that title with Haslett and Williamston.

The loss put Fowlerville at 1-4 in the division and 3-4 overall. The team has two non-league games left for the

The Gladiators started off by trading touchdowns in the first quarter, with St. Johns hitting paydirt first and then Geoffrey Knaggs scoring for Fowlerville on a four-yard quarterback keeper, followed by Payton Johnson kicking the extra point.

However, the 7-7 tie was as close as the Glads got. St. Johns broke loose with 28 points to the Gladiators' 7 in the second period to take a 35-14 lead into the halftime. St. Johns scored on two runs early in the quarter to lead 21-7 before Knaggs narrowed the difference at the 5:46 mark with a 61-yard touchdown run. Johnson again converted the extra-point kick.

Fowlerville's hopes were soon dashed when St. Johns scored twice in the closing minutes of the half—the first touchdown coming with 1:57 left on the clock and the second score with only 11 seconds remaining.

St. Johns widened their lead with a touchdown and a field goal in the third quarter to gain a 45-14 advantage. The Gladiators final points came in the fourth period with Knaggs capping the possession on a one-yard run. Johnson then split the uprights.

The offensive statistics reflected the final score. St. John's had 441 total yards, with 306 coming on the ground and 135 yards in the air. Fowlerville, meanwhile, gained 249 total yards. Knaggs completed 6 of 14 passes for 87 yards and had one interception. Andrew McFadden was 1 of 2 for eight yards and he also had one of his passes intercepted.

On the ground, the Gladiators runners gained 154 yards on 25 attempts. Knaggs was the top rusher with 117 yards on 15 carries

Kaleb Chappell caught two passes for 36 yards, McFadden has three receptions for 32 yards, and JT Maybee and Mitchell Stobierski each made a catch.

On defense, Brenden Gildon made six solo tackles and four assists, Jacob Friel made five solo tackles and five assists, Nick Reason had five solo tackles and one assist, and Jack Lampman had two solo tackles and four assists.

Fowlerville hosted Lansing Catholic this past Friday (past the newspaper deadline) and travel to Corunna for the season finale this Friday, Oct. 19.

James Stauble named "District Support Person of the Year"

Up until recently, one might have referred to James Stauble as the unsung hero of Fowlerville Community Schools. As the Network Administrator for the entire school district, Stauble plays a prominent — yet not as recognizable — role in the educational experience.

A lot of his work is done behind-the-scenes, oftentimes in the summer, to assist teachers and faculty with their technological needs.

"Right now I think we're finally over that hump of daily emergencies such as 'I can't get access to the internet,' 'I can't get access to the shared drive,' 'The copiers are down,' or whatever it happens to be," Stauble said. "We just replaced our network over the summer at the high school and we're in the process of doing that here in the junior high.

"On a day-to-day basis I'm dealing with issues that teachers have with connectivity and juggling the switching of equipment, the cabling and the day to day internet and file access," he added.

This past summer, Stauble was recognized for his work by being named "District Support Person of the Year."

"When they told me, initially I was surprised. I didn't really expect it," he said. "It was a nice acknowledgement but I didn't really dwell on it too much."

Prior to working at the Fowlerville School District, Stauble served in the Navy for 13 years (11 of which were active). It was during this time that he realized he was ready for a change of pace.

"The reason I left (the Navy) was because it had gotten to the point where nothing really changed," Stauble said. "When you work on one aircraft, you've worked on essentially all of them. It just got boring for me. It was the same thing day in and day out. I was also missing my kids growing up, so I decided I needed a change."

With a bachelor's degree from ITT Tech in his back pocket, Stauble decided to put his degree to use. He applied for the position of Desktop Technician at Fowlerville Schools' Technology Department in 2015 and got the job. A little less than a year later he would advance to Network Administrator – a position he has yet to get bored doing.

The daily unpredictable challenges are what keeps him going, Stauble said.

"I think that's why I like this job so much," he explained. "Every single day it's something different. Some things I never even would have thought of just pop out and I'm like, 'This will be fun to figure out. I don't even know where to start.' Every single day you encounter something that you don't know."

James Stauble was born and raised in the Waterford and Pontiac area. He attended several high schools before ultimately deciding to forgo getting his high school diploma in favor of joining the Navy. He eventually obtained his GED in 2001 while in boot camp. In 2015 he received his bachelor's degree in project management from ITT Tech.

Stauble lives in Durand with his wife of nearly 18 years, Tina and their two children, Tessie (18) and Aiden (15). When he is not working, he enjoys playing video games and board games.

Local lady observes 100th birthday on Oct. 4; family & friends celebrate

A local lady observed her 100th birthday on Thursday, Oct. 4, and two days later—on Saturday—family and friends gathered at the Tomato Brothers restaurant in Howell to celebrate this milestone occasion.

Bernice Rackov, a Fowlerville resident, was the recipient of this attention—and rightly so—having lived a long and interesting life and still going strong.

Talking with her prior to the party, Bernice said she "loves roses and carnations," adding that her yellow rose bloomed three times this year and that last year one of her roses lasted until after Christmas.

Asked what the biggest change she's witnessed over the past century, Bernice replied, "Me! And living on my own." She's been on her own since the death of her second husband, Paul Rackov, and still drives and takes care of herself.

The party was not the first celebration of her birthday. "During my last visit to Dr. Tracy's office in Fowlerville, they had balloons and flowers for me," she pointed out.

Bernice was born in Detroit in 1918. At a very early age her family moved to Livonia. She noted that they lived in a tent the first year before her father found a one-room house and some acreage for them to live in. "We called it 'the cottage'," she said.

Life was challenging for her and her family during those early years. Her father was killed when hit by a street car. Her mother remarried later on and the family, which included her brother John and sister Frances, continued living in the small home.

Bernice attended school through the eighth grade and then left to help at home and work at odd jobs. Among her tasks was milking cows her parents had at the place and churning the milk to make butter. She then sold the butter to area neighbors, helping make money for the household.

In 1937, at age 18, she married John Labowksi. They set up housekeepingin Livonia, converting a shack into their first home. They move to Arizona for a year, then to Texas for another year, and finally returned to Michigan.

Bernice worked in the Zimmer Light Body factory for a year during World War II and was a waitress at the 'Pick Quick' House for nearly five years. She was then employed at Montgomry Wards department store for several years and later did light housekeeping at the Northville State Home.

She and John eventually ended their marriage and a few years later, in 1982, Bernice married Paul Rackov. The couple built a home in Fowerville and enjoyed planting a large garden and reaping their harvest. They also planted over a thousand pine trees on their property.

Bernice noted that the lawn covered three-and-half acres and she enjoyed cutting the grass and driving her John Deere tractor, still doing it into her 80's.

"I truly believe keeping busy has led to my longevity," she said.

Her children remarked that their mother "has an incredible memory, remembering dates, events, people, and just about everything else."

They also noted that her words of wisdom to anyone who might ask would be: "Never keep hate in your heart, forget and forgive."

Her four children and their spouses include: Nancy and

Gene (deceased) Guzdial, John (deceased) and Alice Labowski, Tom and Jeanie Labowski, and Judy (deceased) and Keith Alain. She also has 12 grandchilren: Mark, Brian, Jennifer, Joy, Jill, Julie, Dawn, Greg, Philip, Amy, Tammy, and Louie, along with 20 great-grandchildren and 1 great great grandchild—Kenndy.

Handy Township adds new siren to area warning system

For many, many years the siren in the Village of Fowlerville was the only one in the area that could be used to alert residents of dangerous weather that might be approaching.

Last week a second siren was installed on Nicholson Road, just south of Grand River, enhancing the area's warning system. The siren was purchased by the Handy Township Board at a cost of around \$21,000. Putting it up last Wednesday was Westshore Services, a company located in Allendale that specializes in outdoor warning systems and does installations throughout the nation.

"The board was concerned about the residents at Alans Park Mobile Home Park," said Ed Alverson, the township supervisor. "Depending on weather conditions, the village siren can not always be heard. We had this additional siren placed near the park to alert them if a dangerous storm is threatening the Fowlerville area."

Alverson said the siren is designed to be heard within a one-mile radius, but noted that the freeway can act as a sound barrier due to noise and weather conditions. The I-96 freeway is less than a mile from the new siren.

He added that the siren will be activated, when necessary, by the Fowlerville Fire Dept.

As for paying for the siren, Alverson said the township had \$15,000 in a dedicated public-safety account that will be used, with the other \$6,000 taken from the General Fund.

While a four-man crew from Westshore Services did the installation, DTE needs to hook it to the electric line. Alverson noted that once the hook-up is completed, then the siren will be tested.

If in the event electrical service is interrupted, the system has batteries that serve as a back-up to power the siren.

Alverson said that "long term" the board will consider adding a third siren located south of the freeway, giving the warning system an even larger range.

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The new siren was put up so residents at Alans Park Mobile Home Park could better be alerted to dangerous weather approaching the area.

Residents must be registered to vote by close of business on October 9, 2018 in order to vote in the November 6, 2018 General Election. Residents can register with their City or Township Clerk, their County Clerk, or at the Secretary of State Office.

Bob Feig obtains equipment to donate to Mexico

Bob Feig of the Fowlerville Fire Department was "caught doing something great" last month. The deputy chief helped obtain donated firefighting equipment that will be used by several fire departments in Mexico and then loaded it on the trailer that hauled it to that country.

This is the latest in several volunteer efforts by Feig, aimed at assisting his fellow firefighters. A resident of Fowlerville, he has traveled to Mexico to offer training, along with John Watters, a Livingston County paramedic, and others.

"We started accompanying Doug Bunie, a local resident who goes to Empalme, a community in Western Mexico, a couple of times a year," noted Feig. "Doug takes food, clothing, shoes, wheel chairs, and other items that he's collected or people in this area have donated and distributes them in the community as well as neighboring towns. Doug also helps out at the Rotary Eye Glass Clinic that's held in Mexico each year."

Bob first traveled with Burnie in 2013 and has returned eight times since then. While providing training, Feig saw that the department in Empalme and others in neighboring communities lacked equipment and has worked with Burnie to fill that need.

He's also become acquainted with the fire chief in Empalme, Alberto Pienna. "We keep in touch to find out what's needed," said Feig.

With that list in hand, Feig seeks donations of equipment and clothing from Michigan departments.

This time around Bob had a trailer to put the items in, thanks to his boss, Eric Kott. The two of them work at Albright Precision, a company located between Fowlerville

and Howell

"I was telling him we needed a trailer to haul the donated equipment when Doug made his trip this fall, and he told me that he had a travel trailer," Feig noted. "He and his wife, Holly, gave it to me."

Grateful for this unexpected gift, Bob removed the bunk bed, kitchen, bathroom, and cupboards to create as much storage space as possible. He then took it to Burnie's loaded with clothing and equipment, including two AEDs donated by Team Life, turn-out coats, turn-out pants and boots, 50 air packs, 100 spare bottles, and uniform-style shirts.

"Empalme is located 300 miles south of the border," Feig said. "The donations will go there and then be spread out to other communities within a couple hundred mile radius."

Bob also acquired a set of Jaws of Life that is going to Nogales, Mexico, a city located at the border.

"When I first went to Mexico, it was an eye opener," he said. "The departments there were operating with very little equipment. So it's like Christmas when we bring this gear."

Feig has been on the Fowlerville Fire Department for 32 years and has been its deputy chief for 16 years. He along with other members of the local force are involved in a number of outreach programs in addition to their main duties of responding to fires, auto accidents where a fire is possible, and medical emergencies.

As to adding this extra task to what he already does, Bob said, "I enjoy helping people."

Fall and farmers

Take a drive this time of year and you'll no doubt see the evidence of fall taking hold as the turning tree leaves paint our communities a canvas of vibrant color. The pheasant season opens in Lower Michigan this Saturday, Oct. 20, and continues through Nov. 14.

PHEASANT SEASON OUTLOOK

"A few years ago, Outdoor Life magazine rated Michigan's Thumb in the top 10 places in the country to go wild pheasant hunting, which points to the fact that pheasant hunting is still alive and well in our state," said Al Stewart, DNR upland game bird specialist.

"The DNR and our partners are making progress towards creating more quality pheasant hunting opportunities with the Michigan Pheasant Restoration Initiative, a collaborative effort to revitalize Michigan pheasants," Stewart added.

While pheasant populations have been in decline for several years, pheasants can be found in southern Lower Michigan and some areas of the Upper Peninsula. The best counties for pheasant hunting are in south-central to mid-Michigan and into the Thumb. In the U.P., Menominee County is a good place to begin your pheasant-hunting adventure.

There are some localized concentrations of birds elsewhere based on habitat availability. Stewart advises hunters to look for warm-season grasses, especially idled farm fields. Lateseason hunters can have success in cattail and shrub lands adjoining picked agricultural fields.

PHEASANT RESTORATION INITIATIVE

The Michigan Pheasant Restoration Initiative is a conservation initiative to restore and enhance Michigan pheasant habitat, populations and hunting opportunities on private and public lands. The initiative works by acquiring state and federal resources to assist landowners within cooperatives in improving wildlife habitat on their property and by enhancing habitat on selected state game areas, recreation areas, and other public and private lands.

Michigan Pheasant Restoration Initiative partners work to secure adequate staffing to accomplish habitat improvement; hunter access; education and outreach; hunter recruitment, retention and reactivation; and population monitoring goals.

Michigan DNR Fishing Tip-

Lake Whitefish—Not just for commercial anglers

Although extremely important to Great Lakes commercial fishers, lake whitefish are becoming more and more popular with recreational anglers throughout Michigan. But you really have to know how to catch this delicious species!

The lake whitefish has a small, exceedingly delicate mouth and is confined to dining on insects, freshwater shrimp, small fish and fish eggs, and bottom organisms. Most feeding takes place on or near lake-bottoms. Keep that in mind when selecting your bait.

If you're interested in staying inland and looking for lake whitefish, stick with deep, clear-water lakes. If you're interested in heading to the Great Lakes they can most often be found in deep water, either on or near the bottom.
