for school capital improvements

Voters of the Fowlerville Community School District will decide on a \$17.5 million bond issue in an election this Tuesday, May 8. The proposal, if passed, would fund various capital improvements at all five school buildings and at the athletic fields. These include improving building safety and security, replacing aging infrastructure (boilers, roofs, electrical service, flooring, doors, windows, etc.), increasing energy efficiency, and upgrading and replacing technology that is eight or more years

None of this would result in extra taxes for district property owners, said School Superintendent Wayne Roedel. "We would

Voters to decide on \$17.5 million bond issue maintain our current bond levy of 9.55 mills and extend the length of the loan out another four-to-five years to 2040," he explained. Here is the list of specific improvements that would occur with

the money from the bond issue.

All buildings

- -- Upgrade to LED lighting inside and out
- --Replace temperature and lighting controls
- --Install buzz-in security systems at entry doors.
- -- Upgrade all current door access control panels

High School

- --Replace upper windows in the main hallway
- --Replace flooring

Fowlerville Village Council votes 3-2 to appoint Helfmann to vacancy

Fowlerville Village Council voted 3-2 at its meeting last Monday, April 30, to appoint Mary Helfmann as a trustee. She fills the vacancy created with the resignation of Everett DeGrush earlier this year. Her appointment runs until Nov. 20. The seat, itself, will be on the November General Election Non-Partisan Ballot and will be for a four-year term of office. Whoever is elected to this council post will take office after Nov. 20.

The appointment reverses a vote taken two weeks earlier (on April 16) when council rejected a motion to have Helfmann fill the seat by a 3-2 margin.

At the more recent council meeting, Scott Schultheiswho was absent at the previous session—made a motion to reconsider the motion to appoint Helfmann. The vote this time around saw Village President Carol Hill and trustee Ken Bielous once again vote to appoint her, with Schultheis also casting a 'yes' vote.

Once again opposing the motion to have her fill the seat were trustees Jerry Bell and Kathryn Heath. Theresa Mailloux, who had also voted against the appointment, was absent.

After the motion was approved, Helfmann was sworn into office by Village Clerk Kathryn Arledge and participated in the reminder of the meeting as a voting member.

Council had initially sought applications to fill the vacancy by posting an advertisement in the 'Fowlerville News & Views' and placing a notice on the Village of Fowlerville website and Facebook page. Those interested in the position had from March 25-April 4 to apply.

Helfmann and James Mayhew were the two residents who submitted applications within this time frame. Mayhew, however, withdrew his application in favor of Helfmann.

After the motion to appoint Helfmann was rejected,

council approved a follow-up motion "to extend the deadline for another two weeks for accepting and gaining additional applicants." The motion also stated that "for better exposure and community interest, (to) advertise the council vacancy on WHMI Radio Station and in the 'Livingston Daily.'

Council was informed by Arledge that one new application was received during this two-week extension, noting that Chad Lab, a resident of the Village for the past ten years, brought his application to the office on Monday, April 30just prior to the deadline.

The council majority, however, chose not to review his application, deciding instead to appoint Helfmann.

Helfmann had served on council for 16 years during a previous stint, including holding the position of president pro tem. She left the board at the end of her term in 2016, having decided not to seek re-election and to run instead for a seat on the Livingston County Board of Commissioners. She was unsuccessful in this effort, losing in the Republican primary.

She currently serves as the Deputy Register of Deeds for Livingston County and prior to that she was on the office staff for State Senator Joe Hune. She is also co-owner of A-1

Fowlerville Police Officer shoots man with knife, State Police trooper wounded from shrapnel

A news release from the Brighton Post of the Michigan State Police noted that at approximately 5:00am on Sunday, April 29, a trooper from the Michigan State Police (MSP) Brighton Post and an officer from Fowlerville Police Department responded to a call a involving suicidal subject in Handy Township.

When they arrived on scene, the suicidal subject had already injured himself with a knife and was hiding in the basement of the residence. Officers were able to make contact with him and call for an ambulance, but when they attempted to render aid he became combative and moved towards them with the

The Fowlerville officer shot the man to stop the threat. He was airlifted to University of Michigan Hospital where he underwent surgery.

Also injured was the State Trooper when shrapnel from a bullet struck him in the leg. He was treated for his injuries, released from the hospital, and is in good condition.

Officers were also assisted by the Livingston County Sherriff's Office.

The Fowlerville Officer involved in this incident is on administrative leave until the investigation is completed and reviewed by the prosecutor's office. That investigation had not been completed as of Thursday afternoon, May 3.

Members of the MSP First District Special Investigation Section are investigating the incident.

Michigan House Report

As chairman of the House Health Policy Committee and co-chair of the House bipartisan mental health task force, I see firsthand the need for increased mental health awareness in our state. That's why I introduced a resolution naming May 2018 Mental Health Awareness Month in the state of

Tens of thousands of Michigan residents who live with mental and behavioral health illnesses struggle to get the

care they need. In any given year, around 336,000 adults in Michigan are documented having a serious mental illness and 84,000 adolescents experience a major depressive episode, with only 44 percent of all individuals receiving some form of treatment.

I also recently introduced a plan to update Michigan's Assisted Outpatient Treatment law, commonly known as "Kevin's Law," to ensure we take care of mental illness earlier to curb homelessness, dangerous behavior and incarceration. This is not only better for individuals with mental health care needs, but also saves tax dollars by reducing the state's hospital and incarceration costs.

There's still more to be done. We continue to work to eliminate the stigma attached to mental illness and do all we can to improve access to care for those in need.

April was National Financial Literacy Month, and the Michigan Department of Treasury has compiled some tips for student loan borrowers:

- --Visit the financial aid office once a semester;
- -- Take advantage of the resources you've already paid for;
- --Visit the career center or services office;
- -- Make use of your college job board; and
- --Create a studentloans.gov account.

Student loans are a burden, so being informed on what resources are available is a big part of successfully handling debt. For more information, visit www.Michigan.gov/ MIStudentAid.

American Dream for Great Americans

The American Dream seems to be defined in many different ways. Growing up, I generally thought the American Dream was having the freedom to make whatever you wanted out of your life. The government did not force you to abide by a particular job or life role, and if you worked hard, then you could rise through the ranks to be whatever it was you wanted to be. I think many would agree freedom is indeed at least one of the core elements of the American Dream. But there are other, more specific definitions that are used as well.

Some say the American Dream is owning a home. Others describe it as having your dream job. For some, it's achieving popularity and success, however that might be defined. There are plenty of descriptions for the American Dream, and that's fine since I don't think it is bound by one particular definition. Like the American system itself, the American Dream provides options and opportunities through the freedoms guaranteed to us. However you perceive the details, the idea of the American Dream is that it is an open door to the future.

With that being said, I'll share what I see as one of the components that make up the American Dream ideal: selfreliance. Now, I am not talking about false pride that refuses to work with others or accept help. I see it as humble selfsufficiency rather than pompous self-righteousness. One of the reasons a free society such as our own can be so successful is because of a spirit of self-reliance. Under a system like communism, the people must run to the government with every problem they come across, and usually, the government provides a far worse 'solution' than the original problem. Instead, in the American system, the government only provides those things that cannot reasonably be accomplished

This spirit of self-reliance has been embedded in our national identity since the Revolutionary War. We want to make our own way. We don't want to be held back by regulations and restrictions. We want to find a path to success. And along the way, we want to help each other. When we have the ability to do so, we reach out to give someone a hand as others have done for us. That is part of self-reliance. We help each other as individuals without losing that individuality. This allows us to reach for that American Dream without interference from external powers.

Embodying the ideal of self-reliance is hard work. It can be tempting to simply lean on the government when the opportunity is presented, but that opens the doors to many other complications. Certainly, the government does provide many needed and important services that should be utilized when necessary, and there should be no shame attached to that need. However, if we wish to discover the American Dream for ourselves, then I believe we have to be willing to work toward self-reliance. Integrity, hard work, commitment: these are all things that should be embodied by every great American.

If punishment does not work, what does? Catch them doing something right

As I promised in my article from last month "You cannot punish a child into good behavior" here is my follow up-REWARDING APPROXIMATIONS OF SUCCESS and CATCH THEM DOING SOMETHING RIGHT.

Before I reveal more about these two techniques it might be good to first tell you the reasons most parents do not use them.

First, when we approach our jobs as parents like we are teachers or trainers we naturally tend to gravitate toward "correcting" them. We fall into a habit of waiting until they do something incorrectly then step in and show them the right way. Isn't this what teaching is all about?

Second, just correcting is easier. You only have to watch for those few times they make a mistake and quickly give them feedback.

Rewarding Approximation of Success and Catching Them Doing Something Right will take hard work, patience and consistency. Two "Approximation of Success" stories...

Do you remember when your first child took her/his first steps? She first tried to stand up and fell but you just kept encouraging her to try again. Finally after many attempts she takes her first two steps then tumbles to the ground. You run up with tears in your eyes, hugging and kissing your child. So proud of her trying and succeeding! What if instead when she stumbled after her first step you said "Oh no! What is wrong with you! Get up! All the other kids can walk?!"

Do you know how they train dolphins to do those spectacular jumps over a rope 20 feet in the air? Initially the trainer places a rope at the bottom of the tank, after they give the command and the dolphin goes over the rope they get a treat. Then slowly, over weeks, they raise the rope until it is out of the water. But what if instead the trainer started with the rope 20 feet out of the water and punished the dolphin when



In both cases, would the baby try to walk again or the dolphin even want to get near that rope? Yet this is what we often do once a child is older. We suddenly expect so much so fast. Particularly at the beginning of something new we forget to reward incremental improvements along the path of learning. You will instill a "growth mindset" by learning to reward

approximations of success by praising and rewarding effort, choices and the process a child uses instead of simply the end result. This will develop their desire to learn and motivation to always give it their best.

Catching them doing something right goes right along the same lines. Do you remember from last month's article what always breaks my heart to hear from a struggling child? "Sensei, everybody is always

It seems to them like they can't do anything right? It might make more sense if I relate this to you at work. Let's say you have a great day and do nine things really well and your boss lets you know he is happy. But you have one simple task near the end of the day that you mess up on and the boss is mad. Even though you did those nine good things what is the only thing you remember? It takes 20, 30 or 40 good things to erase the bad thing. It is the same for your child.

A child may do something well 9 out of 10 times. Or, do something correctly 90% of the time but what do we spend most of our time focusing or criticizing them about? The one time or the 10%. So try this instead. Go out of your way to recognize and catch the nine times or the 90%. Watch for them doing something right and I bet that 90% goes up!





Letter to the Editor

The Conway Township Board of Trustees will be voting to send the broadband internet bond/millage to the voters for the November general election ballot at its next regularly scheduled meeting on Tuesday, May 15th at 7:00pm. Despite what you may have heard, this issue is not over for the taxpayers of Conway Township.

On Tuesday, April 10th, the final project figure was released to those in attendance at that meeting. The cost is calculated to be \$5.7 million dollars over 20 years. The multiplier used was 2.5179. Despite what you were told on the Conway Township Internet Facebook page, your cost is not necessarily \$20.00/month, it could be higher or lower. The cost varies according to the taxable value (not the SEV) of your property.

On Thursday, April 12th, the PowerPoint was uploaded to the Conway Township Internet page, and it had a multiplier of 4.0286. By Thursday evening, the multiplier changed, once again, to 3.5528. All of a sudden, elected township officials were pressed to pass it because they had been told that taxpavers supported it. However, taxpavers were never fully informed of how much it would cost them.

Taking a taxable value of $100,000 / 1,000 \times 3.5528 =$ \$355.28 per year (IF 3.5528 is the true multiplier) for 20 years. The figure only allows you access to the fiber. You will still be responsible for an internet plan, which could be as low as \$40.00 (50 MB) a month or as high as \$100.00+ for a Gigabyte depending on your want/need. To stream, say Netflix, you would need 1 GB for standard definition video. High Definition video would require up to 3 GB.

To date, it is unsure if the township could even get an internet service provider (ISP) here. The ISP will need a commitment of X number of houses to purchase a plan. You should have received your recent tax assessment with your SEV and taxable value. If you cannot locate it, go to https:// www.livingstonlive.org/Property/search.do to learn your taxable value and use the formula above. Remember, the formula is based on the taxable value of your property(ies).

Large landowners or homes/properties with high taxable value will carry the cost of this project disproportionately. If you do not want it or need it, you will still be paying for others. If a parcel of land never has a house/structure built on it, you will still be paying for others for 20 years. For farmers, their property taxes will rise into the thousands. Farmers who have invested in Conway Township for decades, raised their families, and their families too, will bear the brunt of this project.

Something else to think about with regard to bonds...prior to the recent gas tax hike in Michigan, the last gas tax passed was in 1994. At the time, the state issued bonds to pay for roads, in addition to a tax hike. We're still paying on those bonds today...24 years later. Think about it.

If you have concerns regarding this, you need to contact the Conway Township Board of Trustees before their next regularly scheduled meeting on Tuesday, May 15th. If passed, tell them that this will hurt farmers, low income homeowners, the elderly (who may not use the internet), and the discretionary spending by families. Since the multiplier is a moving target, taxpayers may never know what they are on the hook for. 





God's Perfect Law

Before reading this article, please read Exodus 20:1-17. Down through the centuries and all over the world, the Ten Commandments have played a dominant role in the shaping of legal systems and for determining our moral values.

These ten laws, which God gave to Moses on Mount Sinai, to deliver to the Jewish people, have been used in many parts of the world as a guide for understanding and guidance in determining right and wrong.

As I study the history of different nations in the Bible, I am finding that there is a pattern for what happens when nations fail to adhere to the teachings in these laws. The pattern is, people pray, God blesses, people fall away. After God blesses them, people stop praying and they turn away and stop following the rules found in God's law. Soon after, God judges and abandons them to their sinful and wicked ways. The result is that these people who neglect to follow the laws of God are returned to the state they were in before God blessed them or to an even worse state.

Although we are not bound by the law, we should remember that The law was given by God to secure his Lordship over his people and to protect each person's right to life, home, property, and a society run on the basis of proper relationships. Therefore, it is to the benefit of all to live and abide by the teachings in these laws.

The number ten represents the perfection of divine order, a complete cycle with nothing missing. These ten laws of God contain all that is necessary for us to live holy and godly lives. They are complete! We don't need to add anything to them or take anything away from them.

If we would live by these ten perfect laws of God, we would create a society of peace, not only among ourselves

1 John 5:3(NKJV) For this is the love of God, that we keep His commandments. And His commandments are not burdensome.

If we truly love God and we desire to have the relationship with him that he wants to have with us, we will keep his commandments. Not because of fear of what might happen if we don't, but because we will want to please God by being obedient to him as we would want to please anyone we love and care about.

The scripture tells us: The law of the LORD is perfect, refreshing the soul. The statutes of the LORD are trustworthy, making wise the simple (Psalm 19:7).

But if you look carefully into the perfect law that sets you free, and if you do what it says and don't forget what you heard, then God will bless you for doing it (James 1:25).

The commandments were given to us to give us life. They were not intended to take away our freedom or to make us miserable. God wanted to point us to a way of life that was above the waywardness of constantly being dominated by our instincts and passions. The following of the law would raise our quality of life as well as give us a sense of peace and satisfaction. When the law was first given to the Israelites there was a passion among the people to know God and to follow God. But even so, they failed to do so, time after time.

In general, most Christians have a negative attitude towards God's law today. This attitude has slowly developed over the decades, as more and more Christians turn away from God's Word as their foundation for living. This negative attitude needs to be tempered by the recognition of the positive value of living by the law.

Because of our sinful nature it is impossible to obey the laws of God by using our own power. God knows this. God knows that left to our own resources and understanding, we would never qualify to enter into the kingdom of heaven. That is why Jesus came. He came to show us that God desires our love and obedience. He came to intercede on our behalf and to show us that love for God will create in us a desire to please him by being obedient to him.

Where many Christians make their mistake is believing that there are certain things they must do, or things they must not do, in order to be right with God. They work themselves into a frenzy to do all of the things they believe a good Christian should do. Meanwhile, their personal relationship with God

We can easily spend so much time doing things for God until we soon forget God, if we're not actively seeking to build our relationship with him.


God's perfect law is great. It shows us what God requires of those who would follow him. But God's law has no power. Following it will not save us. It will not get us brownie points with God. It will not even give us the freedom it was designed to give us, if we are not following it out of love for God.

The Bible tells us in 1 Corinthians 13:1-3- If I speak in the tongues of men or of angels, but do not have love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give all I possess to the poor and give over my body to hardship that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

It is good for us to know God's perfect law because it points us to our sin and shows us how we should be living. But we no longer live by the law, we are under grace. Which means, if the law is to be beneficial to us, obeying God's law must come as a result of our love for God and a desire to walk as Jesus walked over 2000 years ago.

If we love God with all that is in us, our hearts will be drawn to him and the holy spirit will guide and direct our every move. Obeying his perfect law will be a natural response to whatever situation we encounter.

May God's peace and blessings be upon all who read these words.

Michigan DNR Fishing Tip— Northern pike season now open

With the recent opening of the inland walleye and northern pike seasons in the Lower Peninsula, will you be getting out soon to try your hand at

northern pike fishing?

Northern pike like to spend their time in the weedy shallows of both the Great Lakes and inland waters. In rivers they can be found around log jams or fallen timber. They are often taken with live bait (such as large minnows) or different kinds of artificial lures.

When fishing for northern pike, many anglers like to use a six to eight-inch wire or steel leader directly in front of hook or lure. Pike have large, deep mouths with extremely sharp teeth. They are known to engulf the entire bait or lure and sever the fishing line with their teeth when it is attached directly to the hook or lure. This leaves the angler watching as the fish swims away with their offering.

George W. Lee Civil War Round Table holding final meeting of season

The final meeting, of the 28th season of the George W. Lee Civil War Round Table, will be this Tuesday, May 8, starting at 7:00 PM. The meeting location is the Livingston County EMS Headquarters Building (aka John E. LaBelle Public Safety Complex), 1911 N. Tooley Rd, Howell. This building is located on the east side of Livingston County Airport. On December 19, 1959 on the eve of the Civil War Centennial, Walter Williams of Houston, Texas died at the purported age of 117. He had been celebrated as the last Confederate soldier and the last Civil War veteran. Ulysses S. Grant III, Chairman of the Civil War Centennial Commission, said that Mr. Williams' death was an occasion for national mourning. President Eisenhower ordered that all American flags be flown at half-staff until his funeral four days later. Unfortunately, the claims made by Williams were not true.

This month's speaker, Larry Hathcock, will demonstrate why Williams' claims were false and discuss the lives of the two men who were the last documented veterans of the Blue and Gray. Mr. Hathcock is a retired upper elementary teacher with thirty years of experience. He holds a B.A. degree from Oakland University and an M.Ed. degree from Wayne State University.

Larry is a past president of the Michigan Regimental Round Table in Farmington and the G. W. Lee Roundtable in Howell. He was born in northern Alabama where he developed his interest in the War Between the States. Members of his family served in the Confederate and Union armies during the war. In 1992, Larry participated in the making of the movie "Gettysburg" at Gettysburg, PA. Over twenty Hathcock men served in the Army of Northern Virginia and fought in the Battle of Gettysburg.
