# Handy Township to seek renewal of road millage in August Primary

Handy Township is seeking a renewal of its road millage in the upcoming August 7<sup>th</sup> Michigan Primary. The proposition seeks voter approval to levy one mill for another four years—starting with the Winter Taxes in December 2019 thru December 2022.

"There's one year left with the current millage authorization, but there's not any local elections scheduled for next year as far as we know," said the township supervisor, Ed Alverson.

The road millage involves only property owners in Precincts 1 and 3. The tax is not levied on properties in the Village of Fowlerville (Precinct 2).

"The money from this millage is segregated in a road fund," noted Alverson. "A hundred percent of the money is used for road projects and dust control."

The recent 2018 Winter Taxes generated about \$175,000, with the dust control costing around \$25,000 to \$26,000 per application. "We typically do three applications a year," said Alverson.

Recent, current, and future road projects in the township include:

--Repaving Sharpe Road from North Fowlerville east fourtenths of a mile at a cost of \$100,000. This was done two years ago.

--Repaving North Cemetery Road from Grand River to Sharpe Road this past May at a cost of \$175,000.

--Applying six inches of gravel, installing new culverts, and ditching on Van Orden Road for two miles from Nicholson Road to the Ingham County line. This project, which is now underway, is budgeted at \$92,000.

--Applying six inches of gravel and ditching on Converse Road from Nicholson Road to Stow Road. The cost will be \$63,000 and work is scheduled to start in July.





### **Everything you wanted to know about Celebrate Recovery & were afraid to ask**

I have found from the personal observation of many people who attend CR that this program is God ordained and is transforming the lives of individuals from all walks of life. Just a couple of weeks ago, I heard a woman share her testimony of how CR has changed her life and gave her the courage to speak up and share with others about the amazing things that have happened to her since joining CR.

However, when I invite people to attend CR, the most common response is: "I don't have a alcohol or drug problem."

Most people, when they hear the word "recovery," immediately associate it with 'drugs' and 'alcohol.' I hope I can clear up some misconceptions that people have about CR

**Myth:** Celebrate Recovery is for people who suffer from alcohol and drug addiction only.

**Fact:** Celebrate Recovery is a program that uses the 12 steps of recovery and the 8 principles of the beatitudes to help people work through issues such as: overeating, compulsive spending, grief, anger, pride, jealousy, rage, co-dependency, depression, as well as chemical addiction etc.CR offers a person the opportunity to participate in a group fellowship where love and hope combine with God's purpose to mend our lives

#### Ask yourself:

- -Are there things in my life that I do that hurt others?
- -Is there something I wish I could live without?
- -Is it time to crack my denial and admit I am not in control of my life?

-Do I have a painful habit or hang-up from which I need to be freed? If you answered "yes" to any of these statements then I urge you to attend a CR meeting to see if it is for you.

#### What is Recovery?

In physical health, recovery refers to the process of moving from illness to wellness. Our hurts, habits and hangups are like an illness and using the tools of CR we begin to move toward wholeness. Some might say from bondage to freedom in Christ. Others might say from self-reliance to faith in Christ.

#### How is this different from other 12 Step programs?

At CR our Higher Power is Jesus Christ and the Word of God is our authority. Our Step Study guidebooks refer to scripture references for instruction. Every Tuesday we begin by worshiping our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ through music and prayer.

#### Who are the leaders of Celebrate Recovery?

The leaders of CR at Fowlerville UB are men and women who have gone through similar hurts, hang-ups, addictions, and harmful behaviors and have been through this or a similar recovery program. The leaders are not counselors and do not offer any professional clinical advice. If professional advice is required, referrals may be made.

#### What types of issues are dealt with at Celebrate Recovery?

A wide variety of hurts, hang-ups and harmful behaviors are represented at CR. Examples include dependency on alcohol or drugs, pornography, low self-esteem, need to control, depression, anger, co-dependency, fear of rejection, fear of abandonment, perfectionism, broken relationships, and abuse.

#### Is there a cost for Celebrate Recovery at Fowlerville UB?

CR does not charge for the ministry. Workbooks are utilized in some aspects of the program and are available at the Resource Table with prices marked.

#### How often does Celebrate Recovery meet?

CR meets every Tuesday evening come rain or shine. The meetings are designed so that a person may begin on the road to recovery at any time. You need not wait for a start date to begin your recovery.

#### **How long does Celebrate Recovery last?**

We meet on Tuesday nights from 6:00 to 9:00pm. Dinner is 6:00 to 7:00pm. Worship, teaching and testimony is 7:00 to 8:00pm, gender specific Open Groups from 8:00 to 9:00pm, and dessert fellowship in the Solid Rock Café from 9:00 to?

A Step Study is a long-term commitment to the members of the group. It will typically take six to twelve months to complete the study. After completing the Step Study, we hope you will join with us as we minister to others dealing with

their hurts, habits and hang-ups.

#### Is there childcare available?

Yes, childcare is provided from 6:45 to 8:50pm, providing you call ahead (48hrs) to arrange it.

#### What if I can't make it every week?

You are welcome to come when you can for worship, Large Group and Open Groups. However, if you join a Step Study, you are expected to come each week until you complete it. As with any endeavor, the more effort you put into CR, the more benefit you will gain.

#### Do I have to be a member of Fowlerville UB Church to attend?

No, CR is a ministry outreach for anyone who is interested in a Christ centered recovery program that will enable them to recover from life's hurts, hang-ups habits and addictions. Many attendees are not members or do not attend Fowlerville UB Church.

#### What do you mean that Celebrate Recovery is a "safe place"?

We are diligent about confidentiality and anonymity – what you hear and who you see at CR stays here. The rules protect all of us from judgment and being "fixed". In a "safe place" you can take off your "mask" and be real and honest without fear. You are 100% in control of when and how much you participate.

#### Do I have to share?

Absolutely not ...... until you are ready. You can pass anytime you wish and for as long as it takes for you to become comfortable.

#### Do men and women meet together?

We all meet together for the Dinner and the Large Group meeting and then dismiss into the Open Groups, men with men and women with women. All Step Study meetings are gender specific.

#### What are Open Groups?

These groups meet Tuesday night from 8:00 to 9:00pm. You meet with fellow strugglers on a specific issue (chemical, codependency, abuse, sexual addictions to name a few.) You share your experience, strength and hope. Open Groups are gender specific.

#### Are there rules that are followed at Celebrate Recovery meetings?

Yes. To insure confidentiality and anonymity the following five Guidelines are followed at all times:

Rule 1 -Your sharing is focused on your own thoughts and feelings and is limited to 3 to 5 minutes.

Rule 2 – There is no cross talk. Cross talk is when two individuals engage in dialogue to the exclusion of others. Each person is free to express feelings without interruption.

 $\pmb{Rule\ 3}$  - We are here to support one another. We will not attempt to "fix" another.

Rule 4 – Anonymity and confidentiality are essential requirements. What is shared in the group stays in the group.

Rule 5 – Offensive language has no place in a Christ-centered group.

#### What is a Step Study?

CR uses the Twelve Steps and Eight Principles as the biblical

model for living your life. A Step Study is a personal journey through each of these steps in community with a group led by a facilitator and co-facilitator who has completed a study. We use Celebrate Recovery's four participants guidebooks. When you finish the study you will have worked your hurts, habits, and hang-ups through each step.

#### All About Time Management

#### New owner busy restoring landmark building; will feature original exterior Former Ford Dealership built in 1916

A landmark building in Downtown Fowlerville, erected in 1916 to house the Ford dealership, is being renovated and will feature its original brick exterior. This renovation is part of a much larger project planned for the overall site.

Karl Witt, a local businessman, purchased the property on the southwest corner of West Grand River and South Grand Avenue in December of last year from the Jon Smith Trust. It includes the building that housed the former dealership's showroom and garage, a former Union 76 gas station to the east that includes a passageway connecting the two buildings and a former Gulf gas station on the west side.

"From what I've learned, the building with its distinctive hoop-shaped roof was designed by Henry Ford and was one of the first three that were put up in the country," said Witt, adding that Roy Sprague owned the franchise at that time.

Other Ford dealerships, using the same design, sprung up in other, nearby communities and around the nation.

Witt added that for most of its 102-year-old history, the building continued to serve as a car dealership and repair facility and had several different owners.

An interruption to this continuity did occur for a few years during the 1960s when the dealership (then owned by Bruce Campbell and later Kurt Campbell) was re-located to a site on North Grand Avenue. That building now accommodates the Family Impact Center.

The reason for this move, that included building a new facility, was that the owners, along with the rest of the community, thought the new I-96 expressway would be routed north of town and that having the dealership near the interchange would be more advantageous.

The Ford automobiles returned to the Downtown in 1967 and remained there until Feb. 28, 2001 under the ownership of Bob Smith and then Jon Smith. On that date, the dealership (with new owners and re-named Fowlerville Ford) opened at its new, larger facility at the freeway interchange south of town

One of the first things Witt did after his purchase was to remove the rough-sawn wood siding that had been put up many years ago by Bob Smith (who also owned and operated the gas station on the east side). That siding had been used to tie the three separate buildings and passageway together, giving it a uniform appearance. The long-ago remodeling included putting an overhang above the front entrance of the dealership.

His next step was to replace the damaged bricks that were uncovered. The problem he faced was that this style of brick is no longer manufactured, and he wanted a matching look. Witt solved the problem by using the bricks from an interior wall that separated the showroom from the garage.

At the same time he fixed the roof. "There were several leaks that we were unable to repair," Witt said. "The new roof features a spray-on covering that's highly efficient and reflects the sunlight."

More recently, he's begun sandblasting the exterior brick walls as a next step in their restoration. He also intends to replace the windows.

Coming up on the 'to do' list are a couple of larger undertakings. "I plan to remove the former gas station on the west side later this year and convert it into a parking lot," he noted. "Next year I'll remove the former gas station on the east side."

The original building put up in 1916 is 68 feet wide by 128 feet long, a total of 8,704 square feet. Sometime afterwards an addition was built on the southwest corner that is 30 feet by 46 feet, a total of 1,380 square feet. Witt plans to keep that addition.

He's also doing a variety of improvements to the interior

of the former dealership, including an upgrade to the electrical system. The building currently has two businesses that use the facility: Jeffrey Automotive is located in the garage area, while Granny Green Thumbs is housed in what was once the front showroom and office area. Ed Jeffrey, the owner of the auto repair shop, worked as a mechanic for Bob Smith Ford and then started his business on March 1, 2001, the day after the dealership closed.

All of this is an expensive undertaking. "My estimate is that it will cost around

\$250,000 to renovate and upgrade the building," Witt said.

In hopes of defraying some of the expense, Witt has joined with five other owners of buildings in Downtown Fowlerville to seek funding from the Michigan Strategic Fund Façade Restoration Initiative—a grant program offered by the Michigan Economic Development.

The actual application has been submitted by the Village's Downtown Development Authority with the purpose of enhancing the character of the Downtown Business District. If approved, the DDA would administer the program. The grant request, based on criteria spelled out in the application, is for a total \$384,500.

While the current businesses will remain as occupants in the building, in the coming years Witt envisions a different use. "The interior, with its beams and historic brickwork, is very unique," he pointed out. "In the future, when the community has grown more, I think it would be a great place to have a restaurant."

Witt has a different aspiration for the area at the southwest corner of the Main Four Corners once he removes the former gas station and passageway.

"I'd like to eventually put up a three-story building," he said. "It would have two commercial spaces on the first floor and apartments on the second and third floors. Since it would cost in excess of \$2 million, the question we're looking at is whether there's a market in Fowlerville for people wanting to live in this type of apartment and willing to pay the amount of rent needed to service the loan."


Witt added that he told the people who designed the plans for this building to leave enough space for the Community Christmas Tree. "I want to make sure this tradition can continue at this location," he said.

Witt joked that he seems to have a habit of buying former automotive dealerships. He is referring to the building where his business, KW Corporation, is located at 307 W. Grand River, a block west of the former Ford garage. That place, which also houses Pizza Box, was once-upon-a-time the Chevrolet-Oldsmobile dealership.

The still-young business owner—who says he is a 'technology implementation contractor'—started the company in 2003, the same year he graduated from Fowlerville High School. During the ensuing 15 years since that startup, his business of installing and then servicing computer information technology (both hardware and software) and security systems has grown to serve an international clientele.

"We work for major corporations at locations in the United States as well as in Canada and Mexico," Witt said. "Our staff, which is headquartered in Fowlerville, varies from 35 to 45 people."

Karl pointed out that he is part of the third generation of the Witt family to live in Fowlerville, adding that his grandfather,

Karl, had a dairy farm on Lovejoy Road, north of town. An aerial photo of that farm hangs on his office wall.

Growing up in the community, he recalled that his father, Roy, would stop at the Union 76 gas station (owned by Bob Smith) and buy him a candy bar.

Such memories, coupled with a desire to preserve local history and also pursue a business opportunity, were what prompted his decision to buy the former Ford dealership. "I figured it needed to be fixed up, and it might as well be me that did it," Witt said. "When I'm done with this project, I intend to do another one in the community. But I'm not wealthy. I have to make it work financially.

"I love Fowlerville and want to try to improve it," he added. "I love challenges and this is a challenge. It keeps me busy."

On the other side of the coin, some people who I have only met once or twice before, I have no problem remembering their names when I see them again. I never could figure out how the mind works, or doesn't work, in such cases.

I'm not as good of a talker as I once was. I find that I have to search around in my mind for the right words and that takes time, so I don't talk as much as I did before.

I have tried to slow time down, but so far it hasn't worked. You know the old saying, a watched pot never boils. Well, it does, too. I've tried it, The water boils as long as the heat is on





# Saint Joseph Mercy Health System brings National Diabetes Prevention Program to Livingston County Saint Joseph Mercy Health System is bringing the National

Saint Joseph Mercy Health System is bringing the National Diabetes Prevention Program (NDPP) to Livingston County. The year-long NDPP will meet at two locations:

--Wednesdays from 10 a.m. to 11 a.m. beginning June 20, 2018. A preview session is scheduled for Wednesday, June 13 from 10 to 11 a.m. The program will be held at the First United Methodist in Howell, located at 1230 Bower Street, Room 10.

--Wednesdays from 2 to 3 p.m. beginning June 20, 2018. A preview session is scheduled for Wednesday, June 13 from 2 to 3 p.m. The program will be held at the Hamburg Senior Center, 10407 Merrill Road in Hamburg.

NDPP helps those at high risk for developing type 2 diabetes adopt and maintain a healthy lifestyle by eating right, increasing physical activity and losing a modest amount of weight. In a classroom setting, a trained lifestyle coach facilitates a small group of participants in learning about behavior changes over 16 one-hour sessions. Topics include healthier eating, getting started with physical activity, overcoming stress, staying motivated, and more. The group helps to motivate and encourage each other. After the initial 16 core sessions, participants meet monthly for additional support to help maintain their progress.

To qualify for NDPP, a person must be overweight and at high risk for developing diabetes, or overweight and have been diagnosed by a physician as someone with prediabetes.

One out of three adults lives with prediabetes, most of which are unaware of their condition. In Michigan, that is about 2.6 million adults. Livingston County has a total population of 187,316 individuals with a diabetes rate of 9.0%. However, type 2 diabetes can be prevented or delayed with a healthy lifestyle, as evidenced through the NDPP.

To participate in the NDPP, a person must be overweight and have prediabetes or be at high risk. Prediabetes is determined by one of the following blood test results:

- -- Fasting plasma glucose between 100-125 mg/d
- -- A1c between 5.7% and 6.4%
- --2-hour plasma glucose between 140 to 199 mg/dl

In addition, a combination of risk factors such as family history, being overweight or obese, gestational diabetes and inactivity may also put a person at risk and therefore make them eligible for the NDPP.


