

Holding on to the Beaten Path

We are a people obsessed with change. If something is not constantly changing, then we dismiss it as lethargic. Everything must keep up with the times. We are a hightempo society, so if something isn't moving, then we figure it must be pointless. That's why we see 'change marketing' work so well for businesses and politicians. "Our product is constantly evolving to meet your needs." Advertisers know

we are always on the move, so they cater to that by selling us a product that will change with us. Change, as we view it, is a number-one priority.

In general terms and most cases, this is arguably true. Change often implies improvements. If a product is always evolving, then we assume it is changing for the better. The company who sold us the product is finding ways to make their customers even happier than when they bought it.

As another example, we change when we set goals for ourselves, and that change is also positive. We wouldn't set harmful goals for ourselves. While change is more often than not a positive development, there are times when it is not necessarily so needful or even beneficial. But since we are in this change-obsessed society, far too often we do not distinguish between good change and bad change. We just hear the word and automatically fall in love with it.

Sometimes, the right thing to do is to defend the status quo rather than fight for change. The phrase "if it's not broken, then don't fix it" is often quoted out of a sense of laziness, but the premise of not messing up something that is good makes sense. America is a nation bent on change, and while I am all for positive changes and improvements, I think we need to check ourselves to make sure we are not trampling over the old beaten paths.

Some things don't need to change. Some things are timeless. After all, the reason the old paths are so beaten down is because of all the people who have come that way before. Those paths are tried and true, so perhaps we should give them a little consideration before we leave them for the latest pathway of change.

Leaders in government are often criticized for not doing their jobs if they are not continually changing some law or regulation. I can understand this since so many things in government need to be fixed. There's a lot worthy of change. However, I am also grateful for those elected officials who stand up for the good things in the status quo. They are demonstrating the wisdom and discernment to know the difference between what should be changed and what should be protected and left the same. We can do that in our own lives. 

Reaching Unchurched People

"But how can they call on him to save them unless they believe in him? And how can they believe in him if they have never heard about him? And how can they hear about him unless someone tells them?" Romans 10:14 NLT)

Before Jesus ascended into heaven, he told His disciples to go to all the nations and preach, teach and baptize in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The disciples were to continue the ministry of discipleship that Jesus taught them while He was with them. They were to take the gospel about the good news of Jesus Christ throughout the world so that everyone, everywhere would have the opportunity to come into the family of God.

A couple of months ago during a men's fellowship time of worship, the men were challenged by the speaker to reach out to the unchurched people in the regions of the world where the gospel has not been preached and beyond, not just in our community. The speaker reminded me of something that I have been preaching for most of my time as a pastor: "We have to come out of our church buildings and take the Word of God to people wherever they may be. We have to meet them where they are and guide them to Jesus."

I have noticed since I have been following Jesus that Christians like to hang out with other Christians. They like being around people who think like them, act like them and believe like them. This is good because the Bible tells us in Hebrews that we should not neglect assembling together and encouraging one another in the faith (10:25). But that doesn't mean we are to neglect the purpose and responsibility of every person who says "I am a Christian and follower of Jesus Christ"

As a modern-day disciple of Jesus, we are to adhere to the commands of Jesus as they are given to us from the pages of scripture, which means, we are to be out there making disciples for Jesus.

Think back to when you became a Christian. What happened to persuade you to give your life to Christ? Did someone witness to you about what Jesus had done in their lives? Were you friends with someone who was a Christian and decided that you wanted to be like them? Did you hear a powerful sermon in Church or on TV and the Holy Spirit convicted you and showed you just how much you needed Christ in your life? Whatever it was or whoever it was, somebody had to tell you about Jesus.

Romans 10:13 says "For whoever will call on the name of the Lord will be saved." But after that, look what it says. "But how can they call on him to save them unless they believe in him? And how can they believe in him if they have never heard about him? And how can they hear about him unless someone tells them?" (Romans 10:14 NLT)

My dear readers please hear me when I say this: "If you say you are a Christian and a follower of Jesus, you should be sharing with someone about the saving grace of God. As the scripture says, "How shall they hear if we don't tell them?" You cannot claim the name of Christian, if you are not willingly obeying the Great Commission (Matt. 28:19-20).

To be a true Christian means that we have repented of our sins, confessed that Jesus is the Son of God, we have accepted his offer of Prevenient Grace, and we are following the example that Jesus set while He walked the earth.



But regardless of how I felt, I knew that God was calling me to go so I prayed hard and got on the plane.

It was one of the most rewarding things I have ever done in my life. I saw firsthand what sharing the love of Jesus can do for a group of men and women who had never experienced it before.

The Christian community has the calling to teach and preach. This means you! Get up! Go out and tell someone about Christ! You may be the only Bible they will ever read.



Area legislators to host town hall on conduct of Judge Theresa Brennan

Area legislators are hosting a town hall on the conduct of Livingston County District Judge Theresa Brennan. Each of them issued statements critical of the judge and of the pace of the investigation.

Sponsoring the event are State Sen. Joe Hune, R-Fowlerville, and state Reps. Lana Theis, R-Brighton, and Hank Vaupel, R-Fowlerville. They said that they will "solicit feedback and statements from Livingston County residents regarding the Livingston County judicial system and issues brought to light from an investigation into the conduct of Judge Theresa Brennan."

The statements and testimonies will be submitted to the Judicial Tenure Commission (JTC) and the State Court Administrative Office (SCAO) for consideration during Brennan's complaint hearing process, the three lawmakers noted.

The town hall will be held Wednesday, Sept. 12, at the Historic Livingston County Court House, located at 200 E. Grand River, Howell, at 4 p.m. in the top floor courtroom.

"I encourage all interested residents to attend, especially those who are willing to share their story about how Judge Brennan has damaged their lives," said Hune. "I am committed to seeing this debacle resolved and the people most hurt by Brennan should be a part of the resolution."

The Judicial Tenure Commission recently issued an amended complaint against Brennan outlining in more detail the numerous allegations of professional and personal misconduct against her.

The commission also posted a scheduling order for the complaint that shows the next steps for the procedure in this issue. Formal complaints against Brennan will be discussed in hearings this October; however, (the legislators noted) none of those hearings are scheduled to take place in Livingston County.

"After receiving so many inquiries on the status of this matter, I am frustrated and appalled with the limited information that has been provided and the length of time allowing closure to drag on," said Vaupel.

"Residents are questioning the integrity of Brennan's version of justice in Livingston County, and they should have the opportunity to voice their stories and their concerns," said Theis. "I encourage any resident who has thoughts on this to attend, speak, and to know that we are listening."

Members of the public wishing to attend are asked to bring copies of relevant information to be turned over to the investigatory body. Written and verbal comments will be welcomed.

What are Political Parties Good For? Plenty, Actually

If you take a dim view of our political parties, you're in sterling company. So did George Washington.

In his famous Farewell Address, he warned us against "the baneful effects of the spirit of [political] party." A political party, he wrote, "agitates the community with ill-founded jealousies and false alarms, kindles the animosity of one part against another, foments occasionally riot and insurrection. It opens the door to foreign influence and corruption..." It's safe to say he was not a fan.

So it's with some trepidation that I want to speak up in favor

of political parties. For well over 165 years, they have played a key role in our representative government. They are the best stage I know for broad economic, political, and social change. It's hard for me to imagine a democracy without them.

This is in part because we live in a very different country from the one George Washington led. The United States today is not just geographically bigger, but immeasurably larger in both population and diversity.

And that's where our two great parties, for the most part, have excelled: they accommodate different interests, opinions, and views. Our system does not have enough consensusbuilding mechanisms; the parties are crucial to this. Strong political parties that can unite groups with different interests have been a source of powerful change in our history.

Of course, more than building consensus within a party is needed. Even though the American people prefer bipartisanship, the parties too often prefer to lambast each other. But legislation passed on a party line vote rarely stands the test of time. To work properly, our system needs a broader consensus — and party-line votes do not provide it. The really effective legislation in our history — Social Security and Medicare, for instance — was passed with solid, bipartisan

Our parties also play a lubricating role in the mechanisms of democracy. They get out the vote and educate voters. They teach many thousands of ordinary Americans what the nuts and bolts of democratic participation look like. They choose,

train, and promote candidates who are (for the most part) worthy of holding public office. They play an important role in funding elections, financing the system, and giving candidates a platform. In short, they're a personnel system for government office.

To be sure, Americans divide rather sharply on their support of political parties — not just on which they support, but on whether to support them at all. Many avoid identification with them. Others become ardent loyalists. Still others follow them regularly, but not slavishly. At the moment, more people define themselves as independent than as a member of one or the other party, but the two parties together still command a majority of the electorate.

I am a member of a party, and have certainly been disappointed in its performance on occasion. Yet I've never felt that my

disappointment was grounds for abandoning the party. Nor, on the other hand, have I ever felt that my loyalty was grounds for despising the other party. I cringe when I hear a member of either party express hatred or accuse the other party of disloyalty. Both parties are patriotic, both want the best for their country — even if they have different ideas about what "best" means. That's part of the democratic dialogue, after all.

That's why I also get uncomfortable with unswerving loyalty to any political party. I think political parties have to earn our loyalty by their performance. And in particular, by their ability to move the nation forward legislatively.

George Washington was right, of course, in pointing out some of the risks of people joining together to form organized parties. But he didn't fully recognize their role as consensusbuilders — their concern with transcending differences and political factionalism and arriving at stances designed to appeal to political majorities both in elections and in legislatures. The most successful party officials I know have made consensusbuilding a priority, both within their own parties and across partisan lines. In a country as diverse and divided as ours, that's not a baneful effect at all.



Financial Aid for Family Caregivers Dear Savvy Senior,

Do you know of any resources that help family caregivers monetarily? I have to miss a lot of work to take care of my elderly mother and it's financially stressing me.

Stretched Thin

Dear Stretched,

Caring for an elder parent can be challenging in many ways, but it can be especially difficult financially if you have to miss work or quit your job to provide care. Fortunately, there are a number of government programs, tax breaks, and other tips that may be able to help you monetarily while you care for your mother. Here are some options to explore.

State assistance: Most states have programs that help low-income seniors pay for in-home care services, including paying family members for care. These programs – which go by various names like "cash and counseling" or "consumer-directed" – vary greatly depending on where you live and, in some states, on whether your mom is on Medicaid. To find out what's available in your state, contact your local Medicaid office.

Veterans benefits: Veterans who need assistance with daily living activities can enroll in the Veteran-Directed Care program. This program, available through VA Medical Centers in 40 states, as well as in Washington, D.C., and Puerto Rico, provides as much as \$2,000 a month, which can be used to pay family members for home care. Visit the "Home and Community Based Services" section at *VA.gov/geriatrics* for information.

Also available to wartime veterans and their surviving spouses is a benefit called Aid and Attendance, which helps pay for in-home care, as well as assisted living and nursing home care. This benefit can also be used to pay family caregivers. To be eligible your mother must need assistance with daily living activities like bathing, dressing or going to the bathroom. And, her annual income must be under \$14,133 as a surviving spouse or \$21,962 for a single veteran, after medical expenses. Her assets must also be less than \$80,000 excluding her home and car. To learn more, go to *Vets.gov/pension*.

Tax breaks: If you pay at least half of your mom's yearly expenses, and her gross income is below \$4,050 (in 2017) not counting her Social Security or disability, you can claim her as a dependent on your taxes and get a \$500 tax credit. For more information, go to *IRS.gov/help/ita* and click on "Whom May I Claim as a Dependent?"

If you can't claim her as a dependent, you may still be able to get a tax break if you're paying more than half her living expenses including medical and long-term care costs, and they exceed 7.5 percent of your adjusted gross income. You can include your own medical expenses in calculating the total. See IRS publication 502, Medical and Dental Expenses (IRS.gov/pub/irs-pdf/p502.pdf) for details.

Long-term care insurance: If your mother has long-term care insurance, check whether it covers in-home care. Some policies permit family members to be paid, although they may exclude people who live in the same household.

Paid caregiver leave: A small but growing number of companies offer paid caregiving leave as a way to recruit and retain their workforce. Additionally, some states provide caregiver benefits or paid leave to take care of ailing family members. Check with your employer to see what, if any, benefits are available to you.

Family funds: If your mother has some savings or other assets, discuss the possibility of her paying you for the care you provide. If she agrees, consult with an elder law attorney about drafting a short-written contract that details the terms of the work and payment arrangements, so everyone involved knows what to expect.

You should also check *BenefitsCheckup.org*, a free, confidential Web tool that can help you search for financial assistance programs that your mom or you may be eligible for.

Medicare Explained

Social Security and Medicare have a few things in common. Both programs help safeguard millions of Americans as well as improve the quality of life for our family and friends. Although both programs are household names, many people may not be familiar with the details of Medicare.

Medicare is our country's health insurance program for people age 65 or older. The program helps with the cost of health care, but it doesn't cover all medical expenses or the cost of most long-term care. You have choices for how you get Medicare coverage. If you choose to have original Medicare coverage, you can buy a Medicare supplement policy (called Medigap) from a private insurance company to cover some of the costs that Medicare does not.

Medicare has four parts:

Medicare Part A (hospital insurance) helps pay for in-patient care in a hospital or skilled nursing facility (following a hospital stay). Part A also pays for some home health care and hospice care.

Medicare Part B (medical insurance) helps pay for services from doctors and other health care providers, outpatient care, home health care, durable medical equipment, and some preventive services.

Medicare Part C (Medicare Advantage) includes all benefits and services covered under Part A and Part B. Some plans include Medicare prescription drug coverage (Medicare Part D) and other extra benefits and services.

Medicare Part D (Medicare prescription drug coverage) helps cover the cost of prescription drugs. Some people with limited resources and income may also be able to get Extra Help with the costs—monthly premiums, annual deductibles, and prescription copayments—related to a Medicare prescription drug plan. The Extra Help is estimated to be worth about \$4,900 per year. You must meet the resources and income requirement.

Medicare's different parts are further explained in our publication at www.socialsecurity.gov/pubs/EN-05-10043.pdf.

If you can't afford to pay your Medicare premiums and other medical costs, you may be able to get help from your state. States offer programs for people eligible for or entitled to Medicare who have low income. Some programs may pay for Medicare premiums and some pay Medicare deductibles and coinsurance. To qualify, you must have Medicare Part A and have limited income and resources.

You can learn more about Medicare, including how to apply for Medicare and get a replacement Medicare card, at www.socialsecurity.gov/benefits/medicare.

In Defense of the Penny

Does it still make sense to have the penny when more purchases are made with credit cards and other forms of electronic payment and the cost to make coins has increased? The answer, for a variety of reasons, is a resounding "yes."

First, consumers benefit with a low denomination coin. The penny helps keep high prices in check. The alternative to the penny, rounding prices to the nickel, hurts consumers.

Second, there is strong public support for the penny. National polling shows that more than 66 percent of Americans favor keeping the penny.

Third, penny elimination doesn't save money. In fact, government costs will increase without the penny.

Fourth, America's wonderful charities raise millions from the penny. Groups like The Salvation Army and Ronald McDonald House Charities rely on these small contributions that prove the penny's value. Each of these points deserves further discussion.

Rounding Hurts Consumers, Especially the Poor

To the first point, economists agree on one principle: businesses are guided by a desire to maximize profits. There is no obvious incentive for businesses to set prices in a way that will lead to rounding down. Research by Penn State economist Ray Lombra, and more recently by Georgetown fellow Robert Shapiro, shows that consumers would be hit with a multi-billion dollar rounding tax without the penny.

According to Federal Reserve studies, people with relatively low incomes (particularly the young, elderly and minorities) use cash more frequently than individuals with higher incomes. In our economy, 60 percent of transactions under \$10 are still conducted in cash. Since only cash transactions will be subject to rounding, any move to eliminate the penny would be regressive and hurt "unbanked" Americans who have no other option and lack the means to make non-cash transactions.

An Overwhelming Number of Americans Want to Keep the Penny

Second, polling over the last 30 years shows strong and unwavering public support for the penny. Polls conducted by Americans for Common Cents consistently show two-thirds (66 percent) to three-quarters (74 percent) of Americans favor keeping the penny in circulation.

Independent polls such as those by Coinstar, USA Today, and CNN/Time never have shown the level of public support for the penny below 60 percent. Americans understand that eliminating the penny would lead to a rounding process and cost them hundreds of millions of dollars in higher prices.

Penny Elimination Doesn't Save Money

Third, rounding to the nickel will lead to a demand for increased production of nickels, with a production cost of almost nine cents. It's hard to see how you save money by making more

nickels that are losing money.

Moreover, there are fixed Mint overhead costs that would continue to be incurred if the Mint eliminates or suspends penny production. An August 2017 study funded by the coin-cashing service Coinstar estimated \$295 million in real annual cost to taxpayers if the penny is eliminated.

Charities Thrive on Pennies

Fourth, many local fundraising drives are fueled by pennies. So too are canister collections by charitable organizations such as the Ronald McDonald House, Muscular Dystrophy Association, the Taco Bell Foundation and Salvation Army, among others. These collections prove the penny's value as money.

America's charities are the foundation of our nation's social safety net and help to ensure that people in need get the help they deserve. Penny drives and other innovative ideas are critical to all charities. The penny also funds innovative cancer research. One example from 2009 is particularly telling. On the 200th anniversary of Abraham Lincoln's birth, the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society celebrated in New York the 1.5 billionth (\$150 million) penny collected by school students across the country for the "Pennies for Patients" program. The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society certainly recognizes that every penny literally counts.

Cash is More Convenient and Secure

Finally, the multitude of data breeches should dispel the notion that the digital economy is more secure. No doubt the credit card companies will continue to discourage the use of cash while trapping people in debt. Similarly, large data companies will continue to force customers to choose their cashless way, all the while profiting from ad buys tied to your digital profile and purchase history. But in a democratic society, freedom should also entail the freedom to choose one's form of payment.

So, can we do without the penny? Not if we want to keep inflation in check, protect America's hard working families, keep government costs down, and continue to help charities raise millions of dollars.





Michigan House Report

By Dr. Hank Vaupel, 47nd District

I participated in the Family Emergency Readiness EXPO on Saturday, September 8^{th} at 2:20 p.m. to discuss how Livingston County residents can cope, survive and prevail during a crisis. I specifically discussed how families can help their pets during an emergency. If you see this in time, I encourage all residents to attend the free event from 9:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m. at the Public Safety Complex at 1911 Tooley Road in Howell.

This week I testified before the Regulatory Reform Committee in support of a plan to bring greater awareness among expectant mothers about the dangers of alcohol consumption during pregnancy. Businesses selling alcohol will be required to post additional warning language on their currently required sign prohibiting the sale of alcohol to minors. The newly added language to post will be, "Pregnancy and alcohol do not mix. Drinking alcoholic beverages, including wine, coolers, and beer, during pregnancy can cause birth defects." A restaurant and bar can also place the above message on a menu. This plan provides a clear, nonconfusing reminder of health hazards that result from the consumption of alcoholic beverages.

The Senate Judiciary Committee approved my plan to ensure state and local agencies meet federal requirements for receiving sensitive tax information. Employees with access to federal databases must undergo a fingerprint-based criminal history record check. It also ensures the results of a background check are kept confidential. I worked on this plan with the Michigan Department of Treasury and Michigan

Department of Health and Human Services.

Patriot Day is an annual observance to remember those injured or killed during the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001. The flag will be flown at half-staff to respect those who have passed away. Special guest, Livingston County Sheriff Mike Murphy attended the annual Michigan House of Representatives 9/11 Memorial Service. The ceremony marked the 17th anniversary of the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks on the United States, and honored military members and service members.

What Our Favorite Books Say About Us

When I turned 60, my family wanted ideas for a suitable, "Wow, you are 60" present. I had arrived at that point that I'd always heard about but didn't believe would happen to me: I didn't want anything material. Instead I requested that my family and friends take time to respond to four questions. Ever the researcher, I thought these questions would help me gauge the pulse of my world — a gift of both mind and heart.

One of these questions is, "What is a favorite book that resonates with you?" I like it because responses come with explanations and offer a glimpse into someone's soul. I have since asked that question elsewhere and always find it enlightening.

For me, different books marked my age. This was also true for others. When I was distracting a friend while exercising, I threw this question her way. Her response? As a teenager, she was drawn to "As a Driven Leaf," a book rich in Jewish philosophy, probing the struggle between tradition and modern day culture. Years later it was "Jayne Eyre," where a strong heroine captures the imagination. That Jayne had immense strength and got the guy were particularly appealing. Her final pick (and by this time we were doing "plank" so the words were more halting and the explanation shorter) was "Harry Potter." The scars of the Holocaust had left my friend needing to believe that good triumphs over evil, and J.K. Rowling did that well.

My friend's response showed a trail of growth from establishing her Jewish identity, to aspiring to be a strong woman with a deep and reciprocal love, to becoming a mature woman with unflappable optimism.

My husband's choices offer a different view — a fiction and non-fiction combination of Michael Connelly's "Harry Bosch" series and John Stuart Mill "On Liberty." His appreciation of Mill began in high school and extended

through college as he contemplated the role of government in an individual's life. To this day, this topic is dear to him as he engages in thoughtful political debate.

The fiction pick, Connelly's "Bosch," is at one level an escapist read that allows us to park our day's stress. Bosch is a man with a great back-story — orphaned as a child, fighting as a tunnel-rat in Vietnam, and eventually becoming an effective but misunderstood police detective. On another level, Bosch's gruff virtue is a testament to noble goals, and fighting for the vulnerable among us.

My picks? I start with a tie between "Huckleberry Finn" and "To Kill a Mockingbird," having reread both many times since high school. Twain challenged society's norms through humor, adventure and character development, and was on the right side of race relations. Huck grew and began to see his world differently over time. "To Kill a Mockingbird" offered similar sensibilities, but it was Calpurnia's strength, and Boo Radley as the misunderstood outcast who saves the day that moved me.

For college and beyond, my uncontested pick is Robert Penn Warren's "All the King's Men" where governor Willie Stark becomes a symbol of naive idealism that succumbs to political corruption. Narrator Jack Burden, also an idealist, supports team-Stark, until he becomes disillusioned by political scandals that waylay their goals. Burden feels betrayed, though he eventually reframes his world and affirms life and love. The evolution of Governor Stark is compelling, and I took heed in the danger of ambition run amok.

My last pick affirms a growing maturity of seeing beneath life's surface. Elizabeth Strout's "Olive Kittridge" features a crusty New Englander who gives the reader many reasons to dislike her. Through Strout's short stories, Olive is alternately the mother-in-law from hell, and the stranger who takes on a young woman's eating disorder with unwavering commitment. All book long, she evolves. In the final scene, we see Olive as a widow opening herself up to a man who shares none of her sensibilities. I loved her complexity and growth as she too begins to see beneath the surface.

What do my picks say? In my youth, color blindness was top of mind, followed by how to become a change agent. At 60, life has had a humbling effect on me, and I seek more understanding before I judge. And omnipresent in this picture, is the importance of love to heal all.

What do your picks say about you?
