



Then he took the Book of the Covenant and read it to the people. They responded, "We will do everything the LORD has said; we will obey" (Exodus 24:7-8).

Because God loves us and wants to see all of us enjoy the gift of salvation, which he graciously provided by sending his only son to die on a cross for the sins we committed, he has given us the holy scriptures, so we can know exactly what it is he desires of us.

God wants above all else, our love and obedience. Read Deut. 6:1-25, 11:26-28, 28:1-68, and Eph. 5:6. These are just a few of the passages in the Bible that demonstrate God's demand for obedience.

If we want to remain pure or undefiled in the eyes of God, we must obey his word without compromising the smallest detail. Which means, we must spend time in the study of the Bible so we can know God's plan for us.

God's standards may seem harsh and unfair to us, especially if our motivation for learning is out of fear for him. However, God wants us to be obedient to him because we love him and trust him. God's standards are much higher than the world's standards because his standards are for our eternal good and designed to protect us from harm.

Happy are people of integrity who follow the law of the Lord. Happy are those who obey his decrees and search for him with all their hearts (Psalm 119:1-2). Do you want to be happy and experience the joy of living that God wants for you? If so, you need to take some time, right now, to stop and do a self-examination of yourself.

Jesus said ... those who obey my commandments are the ones that love me (John 14:21). Try as you may, you will not be able to obey God, without a genuine love for him.

Developing a heart for God is not something that suddenly happens to us. Developing a heart for God has to be cultivated and nurtured by spending time in the Bible, allowing the inspired words of scripture to transform your heart into a heart that yearns for God. If we willingly spend time in the scriptures, God will speak to us and give us godly wisdom.

I used to read the Bible because I felt it was what I should be doing. I skimmed through its pages, omitting the parts that I didn't fully understand and the parts that made me fearful. After reading, I would say a short prayer and then walk away and forget everything I read.

Obedience to God means that we don't skim through the

Bible, we take some time to read it carefully, pray about what we read, asking God to reveal his meaning to us, and then we spend some time in meditation, reflecting on what we read and how we can apply it to our daily lives.

We have an expression we use in Celebrate Recovery, where we say to newcomers, "Don't quit until the miracle happens."

I say to you today that if you're seeking to develop a heart for God, and you earnestly want to grow in your relationship with Jesus Christ, "Open your Bible and spend some time in God's holy word, and don't quit until the miracle happens."

Don't trust your feelings or what seems right, get into the Bible and let God show you what is right.

Whenever I watch a movie about one of the characters in the Bible, I often have my Bible open to see just how much the movie leaves out or adds to the story. The other night as I watched the Book of Daniel, I was surprised to see just how closely the movie followed scripture.

Daniel faced many obstacles to his faith, beginning with being captured and led away to live in captivity, to being put in a lion's den because he refused to pray to a false god. But he never wavered in his faith or his love and obedience to God. Throughout his life, God showed him favor for his obedience. First of all God gave him the ability to interpret dreams which was an asset that got him and his three friends a high place in the government of the Babylonian Empire under King Nebuchadnezzar. Secondly, the plan by his enemies to have him murdered ended up backfiring, and they received the punishment they intended for Daniel. And lastly, he was allowed to see his people return to their homeland to rebuild Jerusalem.

Daniel served four kings—all of whom had the power to have him put to death just for the pleasure of doing so. He faced some tough times that would have caused many to compromise to save their lives. But Daniel remained steadfast. He never lost hope or gave up on God. He remained faithful until the end. Before he died, God gave him a vision of what was to come in the end times.

In the last chapter of Daniel it reads: As for you, go your way until the end. You will rest, and then at the end of days, you will rise again to receive your inheritance set aside for you (Daniel 12:13).

We may not have to face challenges as severe and life threatening as the ones Daniel faced, but you can rest assured that if you choose to set the goal of developing a pure heart for God, you will face many challenges. The enemy of Christ, the devil, will do all in his power to distract, derail, and destroy you. He will not give up as long as you breathe. So stand firm by being grounded and rooted in the scriptures.

When a person becomes a Christian, it means they have accepted Jesus as their savior and they choose to follow him, not the world, the flesh, and the devil. They commit to being Jesus disciples who will follow his guidance and direction for their lives. They commit to being obedient to all that Jesus teaches.

God is always faithful to those who obey him (Deut. 7:9). He will never let us down nor will he ever leave us (Matt. 28:20). You can stand on his promises because they are good and true. For the next week, read Psalm 119:1-16, and Hebrews 5:7-9. Happiness comes from obedience and obedience comes from love. Remember, Jesus is our model and example for obedience, even when obedience means suffering.



Community Forum to be held this Thursday, May 3: will offer information on bond proposal

On Tuesday, May 8th, 2018, Fowlerville Community members will be voting on a proposed \$17.5 million dollar bond issue to address school building safety, replace aging infrastructure (boilers, roofs, electrical service, flooring, doors, windows, etc.), increase energy efficiency and upgrade and replace technology that is eight or more years old.

There will be an open Community Forum on May 3rd in the Junior High Auditorium beginning at 7:00 pm where I will make a presentation on the bond proposal and open the floor up to community members that have questions regarding the proposal. I will use a PowerPoint to give those in attendance a visual representation of the scope of the bond issue proposal and what the District would replace given community support of the bond.

The Board is committed to providing a comprehensive solution to our aging infrastructure and when you review the scope of the bond proposal, you will see that each building will share in the benefits.

Below, I have included answers to some frequently asked questions that have come up when I have discussed the proposal with others. Please feel free to call me directly at 517-223-6016 or attend the Community Forum on May 3rd. I look forward to answering your questions regarding this proposal.

BOND PROJECT'S FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is the community voting for on May 8th?

The ballot question is for a school bond for \$17.5 million, which, if approved by the voters, would be used to perform infrastructure replacement (roof, boilers, furnaces, windows, parking lots, flooring, etc), improve building security, increase the energy efficiency of the district and update the aging technology infrastructure (network switches, network fiber, wifi access points, etc) and devices.

Will your taxes increase if this proposal passes?

No. The proposal is simply an extension of your current

Specifically, what will be the cost of the \$17.5 million bond in terms of our millage rate and the number of years to be paid?

9.55 mils, the same as we are levying now. The tax rate would not go up, but extended for six additional years. We would be out of debt in the 2033 tax year if we don't pursue the bond. If the bond is approved by the voters, our payoff year is the 2039 tax year.

What is the scope of the proposed bond projects? All buildings

Michigan Senate Report

Opposed to Kayak & Canoe Fees

This week is National Park Week, a time when we highlight the natural beauty of our nation and encourage people to take advantage of the many activities and benefits our parks provide. After, of course, they pay the fee.

Nature is not a museum built simply for our amusement. The artificial parts of life are those we create for ourselves: cities, roads, phones, social media and so on. Nature is an escape from these things back to a more balanced and satisfyingly primitive state. Putting barriers between man and nature can only serve to detach us from our reality.

In Michigan, you have to pay for the pleasure of enjoying God's creation. An \$11 Recreation Passport is required to visit our parks and forests. Without the pass you may be subject to tickets or fines.

Now the Michigan State Waterways Commission is suggesting that we add more entry fees to our own parks. The MSWC has proposed mandating a \$10 registration fee to kayaks, canoes and paddleboards eight feet or longer. This means that before you trek out on a memorable and refreshing Michigan adventure, you'll have to go through the hassle of registering your craft.

In many cases, the taxpayers already paid to purchase this public land. If we already own it, we shouldn't have to pay again to use it, especially not through hidden fees like registrations.

Everyone wants to preserve our natural beauty — oftentimes that requires money — but I don't support the idea of adding barriers to enjoying nature's gifts as a means of raising those funds.

I will be voting in support of a resolution to decline the MSWC's proposed fee.



2017 Water Quality Report for the Village of Webberville

This report covers the drinking water quality for the Village of Webberville, for the calendar year 2017. This information is a snapshot of the quality of the water that we provided to you in 2017. Included are details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and state standards.

Your water comes from the Basal Member of the Saginaw Formation via three groundwater wells at a depth of 220 and 210 feet located at 425 S. Maple St. and 180 Pine St. The state performed an assessment of our source water in 2003 to determine the susceptibility or the relative potential of contamination. The susceptibility rating is on a seven-tiered scale from "very-low" to "very-high" based on geologic sensitivity, well construction, water chemistry, and contamination sources. The susceptibility of our source is moderately-high.

There are no significant sources of contamination in our water supply. We are making efforts to protect our sources by participating in a wellhead protection program and conducting regular source water monitoring. - Contaminants and their presence in water: Drinking Water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).
- Vulnerability of sub-populations: Some people may be more vulnerable
 to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immunocompromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing
 chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people
 with HIV/AIDS or other immune systems disorders, some elderly, and
 infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should
 seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/
 CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by
 Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the
 Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).
- Sources of drinking water: The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. Our water comes from wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.
- Contaminants that may be present in source water include:
- * **Microbial contaminants**, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- * Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- * **Pesticides and herbicides**, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture and residential uses.
- * Radioactive contaminants, which are naturally occurring or can be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.
- * Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which provide the same protection for public health.

Water Quality Data

The table below lists all the drinking water contaminants that we detected during the 2017 calendar year. The presence of these contaminants in the water does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Unless otherwise noted, the data presented in this table is from testing done January 1 – December 31, 2017. The State allows us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. All of the data is representative of the water quality, but some are more than one year old.

Terms and abbreviations used:

- <u>Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG)</u>: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- <u>Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)</u>: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
- N/A: Not applicable
- ppb: parts per billion or micrograms per liter
- ppm: parts per million or milligrams per liter
- pCi/I: picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity).
- ActionLevel: The concentration of a contaminant, which, if exceeded, triggers

- treatment, or other requirements that a water system must follow.
- <u>Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MDRL)</u>: Means the highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.
- <u>Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MDRLG)</u>: Means the level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MDRLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to microbial contaminants.
- TTHM: (Total Trihalomethanes) A byproduct of Chlorine disinfectant.

** While your drinking water meets the standard for arsenic it does contain low levels of arsenic. EPA's standard balances the current understanding of arsenic's possible health effects against the costs of removing the arsenic from the drinking water. EPA continues to research the health effects of low levels of arsenic, which is a mineral known to cause cancer in humans at high concentrations and is linked to other health effects such as skin damage and circulatory problems.

***Unregulated contaminants are those for which EPA has not established drinking water standards. Monitoring helps EPA to determine where certain contaminants occur and whether it needs to regulate those contaminants.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The Village of Webberville is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead.

Is our water system meeting other rules that govern our operations? The State and EPA require us to test our water on a regular basis to ensure its safety. Yes, we met all monitoring and reporting requirements for 2017.

We are committed to providing you safe, reliable, and healthy water. We are pleased to provide you with this information to keep you fully informed about your water. We will be updating this report annually, and will also keep you informed of any problems that may occur throughout the year, as they happen.

We invite public participation in decisions that affect drinking water quality. Our village council meetings are held the second Tuesday of each month at 6:30 P.M. at the village hall at 115 S. Main Street. The public is invited.

The thing that really caught my attention, though, was how the story ended. I am a firm believer that the ending of any story is the most important part. A bad movie can turn into a good movie if it has a tremendous ending, and a terrific book can be ruined if the ending is not up to par.

Now, I do not claim to be any sort of expert when it comes to this poem, but I initially viewed the ending as being rather anti-climactic. There is somewhat of a moral at the end when the mariner tells the wedding guest (to whom the poem is directed) to be kind to all creatures, but there didn't seem to be any real point for the tale. However, I think there is a deeper lesson that can be learned from this powerful ending. The last few lines read thusly: "He [the wedding guest] went like one that hath been stunned, And is of sense forlorn: A sadder and a wiser man, He rose the morrow morn."

That right there. That's what hit me! Even when I read it

for the very first time, I was so moved by those few lines that I had to go back and reread them a few times. To me, it speaks volumes of how difficult it can sometimes be to seek wisdom. We should all want to be wise, but are we prepared for the emotional burden that accompanies wisdom? This wedding guest gained new insight, but he was then cursed to carry with him that sorrow tied to the lesson. It is the same for us today. The world is a hard place, and it is often painful to view things as they really are. It is so much easier to just shut out the world around us and ignore the evil that inhabits it.

But we can't do that. We have to do the hard thing. Aristotle covered this point somewhat in The Nicomachean Ethics. In chapter 11 of book 7, we learn that doing the right

thing is more important than seeking pleasure, as pleasure does not contribute to an ultimate good. Don't misunderstand me. I'm not saying that we should all be doom and gloom all of the time without any joy. We should be joyful people enjoying life to the fullest, but if you want to make a difference, be prepared for the emotional trials that you may face.

We can even find evidence of this in Ecclesiastes, the greatest philosophical work that we have, in my humble opinion. Solomon spends nearly the entire book explaining how depressing and seemingly pointless it can be to try to do right in an evil world. However, he ends it by reminding us of the importance of doing what is right, no matter the cost. I, too, encourage you to be strong. It's worth it in the end, but if you seek wisdom, prepare to awake "a sadder and a wiser man."

Is Your Blood Pressure Too High?

Dear Savvy Senior,

What numbers constitute high blood pressure? I use to be pre-hypertensive, but they keep changing the guidelines, so I'm not sure where I fit in now.

Approaching 60

Dear Approaching,

If you're unsure what your blood pressure levels should be, you're not alone. Recent changes in the hypertension guidelines made by the American Heart Association and the American College Cardiology mean that roughly 30 million more Americans than previously thought are now considered to have high blood pressure (hypertension).

According to the new guidelines, anyone with a blood pressure reading above 130/80 is considered to have high blood pressure.

Previously, those with a blood pressure reading between 120/80 and 139/89 would have been put in the pre-hypertension category and wouldn't have been considered hypertensive until they got to 140/90.

But the new guidelines eliminate the pre-hypertension category, putting everyone with systolic pressure readings (top number) between 120 and 129 and a diastolic reading (bottom number) below 80 in a new "elevated" category. And those with a reading of 130/80 or higher fall in some stage of hypertension. Here's a complete rundown of the new five category blood pressure ranges:

Normal: A top number less than 120 and a bottom number less than 80.

Elevated: A top number between 120 and 129, and a bottom number less than 80.

Stage 1: A top number between 130 and 139, or a bottom number between 80 and 89.

Stage 2: A top number of 140 or higher, or a bottom number of 90 or higher.

Hypertensive crisis: A top number over 180 or a bottom number over 120.

Get Checked

Millions of Americans with high blood pressure don't know they have it because it usually has no outward signs or symptoms. But high blood pressure, over time, can damage your arteries and increase your risk for heart disease, stroke, kidney damage and even dementia. To guard against this, everyone over the age of 40, as well as those younger with risk factors for hypertension should get their blood pressure checked at least once a year.

If you find that your blood pressure numbers fall in the "elevated" category, you should take steps now to get it under control. Lifestyle changes like eating a healthy diet, losing

weight, exercising, watching your salt intake, quitting smoking, and cutting back on alcohol is often all you need to get it back to normal.

Even if your blood pressure numbers are in the "stage 1" category, lifestyle changes are recommended first, unless you've had a heart attack or stroke, or you're at high risk for cardiovascular problems because you smoke, have high cholesterol or type 2 diabetes. Then medications may be prescribed.

But if your blood pressure falls in the "stage 2" or higher category, the new guidelines suggest medication, regardless of age, plus lifestyle changes.

There are several different kinds of drugs used to lower blood pressure. It usually makes sense to start with the oldest, safest, and least expensive drug: diuretics, or water pills, such as chlorthalidone or hydrochlorothiazide. But these meds can drive up blood sugar levels, so if you have type 2 diabetes or are at risk of it, your doctor may prescribe another drug, such as an ACE inhibitor, ARB or calcium channel blocker.

You should also be aware that blood pressure drugs could cause side effects including dizziness, gastrointestinal problems, fatigue and headaches. They can also cause a decline in kidney function so make sure your doctor periodically monitors your potassium levels.

Michigan House Report

By Dr. Hank Vaupel, 47nd District

Substance abuse is a growing problem in Michigan. Opioid deaths in Michigan rose from 622 in 2011 to 1,689 in 2016, according to the state Department of Health and Human Services. Opioid prescriptions in the state now top 11 million per year – more than the state's population.

Now, more than ever, we need to fund our local community mental health (CMH) agencies that are equipped to help people struggling with addiction. Legislation introduced in the House would dedicate 50 percent of future revenues raised through state liquor taxes to Michigan's local CMH agencies. The funding could provide more than \$3 million this year to combat alcohol-related disorders, opiate addiction and other conditions, and as much as \$20 million in future years.

The bill was approved by the House Health Policy Committee, which I chair, and the full House, and now moves to the state Senate for consideration.

I was pleased to attend a poster contest hosted by the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality as part of this year's Earth Day celebrations. First place was awarded to Livingston County's own Chloe Caldwell. Chloe is a fourth-grade student at Round Elementary School in Hartland, and her poster was a drawing emphasizing the importance of bees in our ecosystem. Congratulations to Chloe on a job well done!

I recently attended a banquet hosted by the Livingston County Veterans' Council honoring Veteran of the Year Charlie Brock and Auxiliary of the Year June Holley. Veterans and their spouses have done so much for their country, and individuals like Charlie and June give even more through service to the community. The awards are very well deserved, and I wish them both the best.

The Fowlerville Harness Horsemen organization hosted its community dinner on Sunday, and I was happy to attend. The Fowlerville Harness Horsemen group supports the local Fowlerville Family Fair in a variety of ways related to harness racing. Thank you to everyone who participated in the dinner and to the association for its community involvement.

Congratulations to the honorees at the Hartland Optimist Club. I attended the annual awards breakfast, and I was impressed by the great community service by the individuals in the club. Thank you to all the volunteers for your work throughout Livingston County!

Northern Lower Peninsula

Most everyone is familiar with the "Holy Waters" of the Au Sable, Manistee and Pigeon rivers, but the Sturgeon River also offers great fishing. For lakes, there are several in Montmorency County that are great to try. Southwest Lower Peninsula

The St. Joseph River proves to be a great destination, along with the Dowagiac Creek and the Dowagiac River. Many tributaries to the Grand River also support populations of brown trout.

Upper Peninsula

Try the lakes in Iron, Marquette, Alger, Luce and Schoolcraft counties or the Fox River system near Seney.
