# Fowlerville School District voters reject bond issue by 33-vote margin

Fowlerville School District voters rejected a \$37.8 million bond issue by a slim margin in an election held last Tuesday, May 4. The unofficial results showed 902 'no' votes to 869 'yes' ballots—a difference of 33 votes.

The turnout of 1,771 residents represented 13.82 percent of the 12,811 registered voters in the school district.

School Superintendent Wayne Roedel said that school officials would be seeking input from the community before deciding on the next step.

"I want to take this opportunity to thank the Fowlerville Community for all of their past support of the school district," Roedel said in a statement given the day after the vote. "Even though this current proposal did not pass, it is an opportunity for the district to reflect on our process and to dig deeper into the reasons why the proposal was not successful. I look forward to having conversations with community members regarding our vision for the campus moving forward.

"In the near term, the Fowlerville Board of Education will work with administration and the community to determine the best next steps with an understanding that the earliest another election could take place is in August, with a deadline to file of May 11th, but more realistically in the general election in November."

Among the options facing the board are to seek the same proposal in another election, given the close margin and small turnout, modify it based on the input, or—given the defeat not seek a second vote.

In the proposal put before voters last week, school officials had pointed out that the measure would not raise the millage levy for bonded projects above the current 9.55 mills, but would extend the length of the bond issue another six years, from 2044 to 2050.

The centerpiece of the proposal was the construction of a new 72,000 square-foot K-2 elementary building. The plans also called for moving the Early Childhood Development Center and the Recreation Department, now housed in the Munn facility, to the Smith School and decommissioning and demolishing the Munn building

The board of education, in seeking the bond issue, felt a new school was a better use of funds than renovating Munn, given the age of that building and the cost of upgrading it. Architects and construction consultants have told school officials that necessary upgrades or replacements to the heating and water systems, a new roof, and other mechanical systems at Munn would cost around \$20 million over the next ten years.

The core of the facility was initially built in 1955—being opened as the then new high school. Two additions occurred in later years.

Another major component of the bond issue was money to provide climate control, including cooling systems in all of the academic buildings. The cost is put at \$7.3 million.

More specifically, Kreeger Elementary and the Junior High would have seen the immediate installation of air conditioning, while the High School would be equipped with electrical upgrades to handle a new AC system at a future date.

Air conditioning would also be installed at the Smith building and would be included in the new K-2 facility.

### **Priorities for America's Future**

The last year changed priorities for many people and caused us to look at issues in new ways. Beyond our personal lives, some issues on the local, state, and federal level are new, or at least have been granted greater focus and priority, and others are continual challenges that still need to be addressed alongside these developing and increasingly prominent problem sets. With so many diverse tasks, it can be difficult to even keep track of them all, let alone remain laser-focused on what should be prioritized!

While the impact of and emphasis on many issues will ebb and flow, I want to highlight two priorities I believe are important for America's future. First, the US must not neglect foreign policy and national security. As domestic politics and policies become more complex, so too does the international landscape. International terrorism remains a threat while the global outlook shifts toward great power competition. Foreign policy challenges today involve blurred lines of conflict and new technologies and tactics, such as artificial intelligence, cybersecurity, and disinformation.

National security is also growing in complexity as one must consider diplomatic, informational, military, and economic instruments of national power and understand

how they affect each other. America's success in one area does not guarantee achievement in another. A wholistic approach is necessary to protect Americans and America's interests, and this outcome requires purposeful, sound understanding and analysis. Foreign policy and national security cannot be second thoughts in policy decision-making.

Second, we prioritize the wellbeing of our communities. Many of the problems we face, from emotional to economic concerns, can be addressed on the individual level. In fact, the most effective solutions are most likely to come from neighborto-neighbor or familial interactions. We should care for one another and invest in our communities. Stronger localities will lead to a greater whole, and each of us can contribute directly to that endeavor.

One way to look at this pairing is protection of our national interests and protection of our individual needs. These two priorities are purposefully vague since there are a wide variety of challenges within each, but this framework can help reduce clutter and provide a point of reference for prioritization and purpose. No matter what specific issues America faces in the future, these two emphases will never lose their importance. May we continue to invest in each other (and thus in our nation!).

#### **Getting Control of Your Thoughts**

As a recovering alcoholic for more than thirty-one years, I know how important it is to watch over my thoughts and

not let them get out-of-control. Most people who experience a relapse in their recovery progress, relapse mentally before the physical action takes place.

Our thoughts will always be drawn toward what we value the most. Therefore, if my greatest desire in life is to be an obedient and faithful follower of Jesus, then my thoughts need to be focused on Him and the gift of salvation which He died to give me.

Sometimes when I sit down to read the scriptures and spend some quiet time with God, unwanted and unsolicited thoughts begin circling in my head, and I find it difficult to concentrate on what I'm reading.

When distracting thoughts begin bombarding my mind every time I open God's Word, I know it is nothing more than the spiritual forces of evil trying to distract me and redirect my focus away from my chosen objective, which is to grow

closer in my relationship with Jesus. Controlling my thoughts is essential if I am to be an obedient follower of Jesus.

There is an old saying that goes, "You may not be able to stop a bird from landing in your hair, but you don't have to allow him to build a nest."

It is the same with unwanted and unsolicited thoughts that we receive. We may not be able to stop them from coming, but we don't have to allow them to occupy valuable space in our brain that could eventually lead us away from the course we have set.

The Bible gives us good instruction for controlling our thoughts. Philippians 4:6-8 says, "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable--if anything is excellent or praiseworthy--think about such things."

First of all, "we are not to be anxious about anything." To be anxious is to worry. If we are faithful believers and obedient to Christ, our lives should be worry-free. Anyone who has accepted Jesus as their Lord has nothing to worry about because their destiny is already confirmed.

Instead of worrying about things we cannot change, we must focus on the things we can, which is the next point in the above scripture. "By prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God." Notice it says, "by prayer and petition."

Our prayer time is where some of us get lost. Prayer is communication with God. For communication to occur, there has to be a sender and a receiver. When we go to God in prayer, we approach Him with a long list of the things we want Him to do for us. Some people spend their entire prayer time requesting and pleading for what they want and never once stop to think about what God wants from them.

God has a voice! Prayer and petition suggests that before we start asking God to do something for us, we should first listen to what He has to say to us.

There have been times when I have been presenting my requests to God in prayer, and He has shown me I needed to be quiet and listen for a while. Sometimes we need to listen more and talk less.

Finally, God gives us the solution for having a more controlled thought life. He says, "whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable--if anything is excellent or praiseworthy--think about such things."

When our thoughts are on these things, the thoughts the enemy sends at us will be squashed before they have time to harm us.

It is impossible to think about two things at the same time. So, when our thoughts continually focus on things that are pure, lovely, and admiral, our lives will be more inclined to follow what the Holy Spirit tells us and less likely to surrender and give in to the temptation of evil and ungodly thoughts.

The past year has been challenging and devastating to many who struggle with accepting how the pandemic has changed and interfered with the way we do things. Much of the anxiety people are experiencing is created by unhealthy thoughts, which has created fear, frustration, anger, and a sense of hopelessness.

It is time to take control of your thoughts. It is time to redirect your focus away from the negative and powerstealing thoughts that invade your mind. It's time to turn your eyes toward Jesus. Jesus is your only hope.

Think about this for the next week. Jesus walked among sinners, but He never sinned. He taught and preached the message of salvation even though He knew the religious leaders and their cohorts wanted to silence or kill Him. His message never changed. "Love God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength." (Mark 12:30), and "Love one another as I have loved you." (John 13:34).

As simplistic as it may sound, this is the solution for all the problems of the world. It is a solution that God has longed to see us achieve since Adam and Eve committed the first sin. It is the solution that you and I must accept and adopt for our lives if we expect to spend eternity in heaven with our Lord Jesus. It begins with taking control of our thoughts, repenting of our sins, and redirecting our focus toward Jesus and His Gracious Love.

Dear God, please teach me to listen to you more than I petition you. Help me to focus on the things that are pleasing to You. Amen.


# Fowlerville Varsity Softball Team wins pair of league games vs. Mason

## Building a cleaner, safer campfire makes for a more enjoyable outing

Marshmallows, hot dogs and kebabs are classic fireside fare. Peaches are trending, and there's no better way to start the day than with a cast-iron skillet breakfast fresh off the fire. We're talking campfire cooking and bonfire season! As we welcome these summer traditions, remember to keep campfires safe and clean by carefully choosing what they're made from.

In a crowded environment like a campground or neighborhood, making fires out of the right materials is

especially important for protecting the health and safety of yourself and those around you.

To start, build a campfire out of the driest, most wellseasoned wood you can find. Get it locally to avoid spreading invasive insects and tree diseases, and make sure to burn it all before you leave for another location. Dry wood produces the least amount of irritating smoke, meaning you'll spend less time repositioning around the fire ring chanting a version of "I hate white rabbits" in an attempt to ward off those pesky clouds.

Natural materials like wood, brush and branches can be burned. However, avoid burning treated wood, which often can be identified by a manufacturer's stamp and a greenish color. Treated wood releases arsenic or other chemicals in the air when burned.

Likewise, don't toss trash, plastic food wrappers, foam cups or hazardous materials in your campfire - it's illegal, not to mention stinky and unhealthy. If you plan to cook a s'mores or other foods over the fire, it's worth the extra effort to properly dispose of trash to keep the air clean and keep a bad taste out of your mouth.





# **Ingham County Comments**

#### \*Small Business Rescue Program:

Last week, Ingham County took action to assist small businesses negatively affected by the COVID-19 pandemic by approving an \$11 million Small Business Rescue Grant program to be administered by the Lansing Economic Area Partnership) LEAP. The money will come from Ingham County's \$56.7 million allocation from the American Rescue Plan (ARP) act.

Ingham County will receive the funds in two separate payments. The first amount, consisting of 50% of the funds, will be allocated within 60 days of the bill signature (March 11, 2021). The second amount is to be spent within 12 months.

Eligible funds of the ARP include addressing the economic impacts of COVID-19 on households, small businesses, nonprofits, and industries such as tourism, travel and hospitality. The Ingham County Board of Commissioners realize that those economically impacted are in need of assistance immediately.

In addition to the Small Business Rescue Grant Program resolution, Ingham County also passed a resolution to provide lost revenue to the Greater Lansing Convention and Visitor's Bureau through the ARP funds for tourism-related target marketing campaigns, promotion of businesses that make up Ingham County's visitor economy and to encourage residents to explore Ingham County.

The Greater Lansing Convention Bureau receives a majority of its' funding through Ingham County hotel/ motel tax receipts that have been down dramatically during COVID-19.

Ingham County also plans to partner with Capital Area Community Services and Capital Area Housing Partnership to begin distributing ARP funds to households and residents negatively affected by COVID-19.

I would encourage local businesses to apply to LEAP. Ideally, they will work at the local Chamber level and share information quickly with each other.

As with any program, there will be some who benefit more than others. There will be some who maintained reserves to weather storms, others who did not or could not manage reserves (as Dave Ramsey promotes). However, the County is doing the best it can with the funds and to get relief to as many as possible.

# TOWNSHIP OF HANDY NOTICE OF ADOPTION: AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE TOWNSHIP'S ZONING ORDINANCE REGARDING MUNICIPAL PROPERTY DISTRICT

To the residents and property owners of the Township of Handy, Livingston County, Michigan, and all other interested persons:

On April 28, 2021, the Township of Handy (the "Township") adopted an Ordinance to Amend the Township's Zoning Ordinance Regarding Municipal Property District ("Ordinance"). A summary of the Ordinance is provided below. A true copy of the Ordinance, including any exhibits, is available for inspection at the Township Hall, 135 N Grand Ave, PO Box 189, Fowlerville, MI 48836.

<u>Section 1.</u> This section adds a Chapter 22 to the Township's Zoning Ordinance, which shall read, in its entirety, as follows:

# CHAPTER 22 MP – MUNICIPAL PROPERTY DISTRICT

#### **SECTION 22.1 INTENT**

It is the intent of the Municipal Property (MP) District to provide adequate land resources for the purposes of administering and performing necessary and important public services by the Township of Handy and other public or quasi-public institutions offices. Lands within this district are intended solely for public and quasi-public buildings and uses and it is intended that no land will be placed within this district until such land falls under public or quasi-public ownership.

#### SECTION 22.2 PERMITTED USES

Uses Permitted By Right:

- 1. Public conservation areas, parks, game refuges, and similar uses.
- 2. Public schools.
- Administrative offices and maintenance buildings of municipal corporations such as but not limited to Livingston County, the State of Michigan or the United States of America.
- 4. Municipal water supply and treatment facilities.
- 5. Municipal fire, police and other public safety facilities.
- 6. Municipal sewage disposal and treatment facilities.
- 7. Municipally owned and maintained cemeteries and/or mausoleums.

#### SECTION 22.3 SPECIAL USES

No land and/or buildings in the MP District shall be used, except for the following purposes when approved in accordance with the requirements of Chapter 16.

- 1. Public excavation operations.
- 2. Public communication towers on land owned by Handy Township.
- 3. Public and Quasi-Public utilities and accessory buildings associated with electric, gas, cable, etc.

#### SECTION 22.4 SITE DEVELOPMENT REQUIREMENTS

All Permitted Uses and Special Uses are subject to the following Site Development Requirements

- A. Site Plan Review is required for all Special Uses in accordance with Chapter 15, Section 15.1.
- B. Parking is required in accordance with Chapter 15, Section 15.2.
- C. Signs are permitted in accordance with the requirements of Chapter 15, Section 15.3.
- D. Setbacks, height, area, and lot dimension requirements shall be met as noted on the chart in District Regulations, Chapter 15.

<u>Section 2.</u> This section provides that if any portion of the Ordinance is found invalid for any reason, such holding shall not be construed as affecting the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

<u>Section 3.</u> This section provides that any ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed but only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

 $\underline{\text{Section 4.}}$  This section provides that the Ordinance shall take effect seven days after publication.



## Despite economic adversity, state historic preservationists plan ahead

Amid economic challenges, a new statewide plan and collective efforts could provide more opportunities to showcase the state's history, preservationists say.

"We want to make it easier to apply for our programs," said Amy Arnold, a preservation planner for the Michigan State Historic Preservation Office.

Those programs include the Michigan Lighthouse Assistance Program, Historic Preservation Tax Credits and Certified Local Government partnership.

Arnold said the preservation office will use the 2020-25 Michigan Statewide Historic Preservation Plan in assessing opportunities and challenges that face historic preservation. According to the agency, it approved 142 projects for tax credits between 2014-19 and distributed more than \$1.7 million in additional grants for preservation activities.

The new plan includes preservation education, expanded funding opportunities and increased diversity in historic

Although funding remains undetermined, Arnold said that the agency anticipates reaching this year's goals.

She said the state intends to implement the new plan in the

"It takes about a year for the whole process," Arnold said. Arnold said her office will promote the plan using social media — between its Facebook and Twitter accounts, it has approximately 8,500 followers.

The office will send a link to the plan to Michigan's 76 communities with historic district commissions, will provide information to participants in the statewide Historic Preservation Network annual conference and email participants at public and stakeholder planning meetings.

Although the federal government requires the preservation office to create a new plan every five years, Arnold said the basic format remains the same.

"What changes is the assessment of accomplishments that highlights actions that were undertaken to meet the last plan's goals, the identification of the threatened resources and the acknowledgement of issues that will impact preservation

over the next five years," she said.

The plan includes increasing partnerships, such as one with the Department of Natural Resources. The Michigan History Center is part of the department.

"We are committed to the stories and the special places of Michigan," said Suzanne Fischer, the center's museum

director. "We are always preserving something or someplace for the people of Michigan."

The center manages 12 historic sites — eight of them in parks. They offer exhibits and programs about Michigan's history.

They include Mann House in Concord, Tawas Point Lighthouse in East Tawas and Sanilac Petroglyphs in Cass City.

The Michigan History Center also manages the Ulysses S. Grant home, which was moved last year from the State Fairgrounds in Detroit to Detroit's Eastern Market. Grant, who later became the 18th U.S. president, lived there from April 1849 to May 1850 while stationed in Detroit as an Army officer, according Historic Detroit's website, historicdetroit.org.

"We are really excited to share it with communities," Fischer said.

To preserve the state's history takes a "collective effort," she said.

May is Historic Preservation Month.

## **Medicare Coverage Options for Retirees Eager to Travel**

#### Dear Savvy Senior,

What are the best Medicare coverage options for COVIDvaccinated retirees who are eager to travel? My wife and I will both turn 65 over the next few months and would like to know which Medicare plans are best for extensive travelers. Almost 65

#### Dear Almost,

The best Medicare plans for retirees who plan to travel will vary depending on your destinations. But, before you book a trip make sure you know the current CDC COVID-19 travel recommendations (see CDC.gov/coronavirus/2019ncov/travelers), and research your destinations too so you can know if restrictions apply wherever you're going.

#### **Medicare Review**

Before we dissect how Medicare works for travelers, let's start with a quick review of your different Medicare options.

One option is original Medicare, which covers (Part A) hospital services and (Part B) doctor's visits and other medical services.

If you choose original Medicare, you may also want to get a Medicare (Part D) prescription drug plan (if you don't already have coverage) to cover your medications, and a Medicare supplemental (Medigap) policy to help pay for things that aren't covered by Medicare like copayments, coinsurance and deductibles.

Or, you could get a Medicare Advantage (Part C) plan instead, which is sold through private insurance companies, and covers everything original Medicare covers, plus many plans also offer prescription drug coverage and extra services like vision, hearing and dental care all in one plan.

To help you evaluate your options contact your State Health Insurance Assistance Program (see ShiptaCenter.org), which provides free Medicare counseling.

You can also shop and compare Medicare health and drug plans and Medigap policies at Medicare.gov/find-a-plan.

Also note that whatever Medicare plans you choose to enroll in, if you find that they are not meeting your needs or your needs change, you can always switch to a different plan during the open enrollment period, which is between Oct. 15 and Dec. 7.

#### U.S. Travel

If you and your husband are planning to travel domestically, original Medicare may be the better option because it provides coverage everywhere in the U.S. and its territories as long as the doctor or hospital accepts Medicare.

Medicare Advantage plans, on the other hand, which have become very popular among new enrollees may restrict your coverage when traveling throughout the U.S. This is because most Medicare Advantage plans are HMOs or PPOs and

require you to use doctors, hospitals and pharmacies that are in the plan's network within a service area or geographic region. So, if you're traveling outside that area you may need to pay a higher fee, or your services may not be covered at all.

If you do decide to enroll in a Medicare Advantage plan, be sure you check the benefit details carefully to see what costs and rules apply when traveling outside your service

#### Traveling Abroad

If you're planning to travel abroad much, a Medicare Advantage plan may be a better option because many Advantage plans today offer emergency care coverage outside the U.S. But be sure you check before you choose a plan because not all plans offer it.


Original Medicare, on the other hand does not provide coverage outside the U.S. and its territories except in rare circumstances Medicare.gov/ coverage/travel), and Medicare drug plans will not cover prescription drugs purchased outside the U.S. either.

But if you do choose original Medicare, you can still get some coverage abroad through a Medigap policy. Plans D, G, M and N plans will pay for 80 percent of medically necessary emergency care outside the U.S. to new enrollees, but only for the first 60 days of the trip, and you have to meet an annual \$250 deductible first. There's also a lifetime limit of \$50,000, so you'd need to cover any costs above that amount.

Some beneficiaries, regardless of their Medicare coverage, purchase travel medical insurance for trips abroad, which you can shop for at InsureMyTrip.com or SquareMouth.com.

# Resin shortages add to high cost of home construction materials

Deep freezes in Texas in February caused resin plants to stop production abruptly, leading to shortages and price increases of products that use this product.

According to Robert Filka, the CEO of the Home Builders Association of Michigan, the effects of the shortage are adversely impacting many aspects of construction.

"The shortage of resin has caused shortages for all kinds of different products — everything from plumbing materials and all other materials that go into a house," Filka said. "We are seeing incredible shortages and delays in products that have resin in them."

Resin is a plasticlike substance that is a blend of composite materials. It's used to make many building and manufacturing materials

Meanwhile, the Michigan Manufacturers Association says the shortage hasn't caused major problems for its members.

Shortages make it difficult to estimate what the final cost

of a home will be, Filka said, "because literally from the time they sign a contract to the time a builder might start building, prices have been increasing by thousands and thousands of dollars, depending on the size of the project."

According to Filka, construction of homes at the lower- to middle-price points are affected the most.

"People at higher-end price points are going to be able to absorb those increases better than the average Michigander," he said

Filka says that the impact of shortages on the housing market is concerning.

"We already have a ton of pressure on the existing homes that are for sale, and there's very few of them," he said. "People are paying higher prices for them because of the lack of housing that's affordable."

According to Filka, the association advises its members to include "price escalation clauses" in contracts, but homebuilders are still facing setbacks.

"We've been hearing some reports of a slowdown in people who were planning on construction of new homes," he said. "They may be pausing right now simply because of those escalating prices." Filka said that the pandemic has increased demand for homebuilding materials.

"More people are working from home and seeing all the projects they want to get done," he said. "That, along with severe housing shortages, has really spiked demand, yet production has actually gone down."

Additionally, construction prices are rising because of lumber shortages.

"COVID has put some impact on production," Filka said. "You've also got factories and mills having to operate under COVID restrictions so they can't produce as much as they used to, yet demand for wood and building materials has skyrocketed since the pandemic."

Filka describes the current situation as "the perfect storm." "It's created a real crazy environment for residential construction and remodeling right now," he said.

For Michigan manufacturers however, the shortage hasn't brought serious difficulties.

According to Caroline Liethen, the director of environmental and regulatory policy for the Michigan Manufacturers Association: "Higher prices for rubber are a direct result of a supply shortage. Rubber prices reached a four-year high in February, according to Bloomberg data."

Despite that, Liethen said, "auto manufacturing in Michigan has not seen a significant impact from the shortage."

David Barnas, a group manager in financial communications at General Motors Co., said that GM is working closely with its supply base to mitigate the effects of the shortage.

"We don't anticipate any immediate production impacts," Barnas said.
