

# Savvy Senior Column

### **Simple Gadgets That Can Help Older Drivers** Dear Savvy Senior,

Are there any specific auto gadgets you can recommend that can help senior drivers? Both of my parents are in their eighties and still pretty good drivers, but due to arthritis and age they're very stiff, which causes them some driving problems.

#### Dear Researching,

To help keep senior drivers safe and prolong their driving years, there's a plethora of inexpensive, aftermarket vehicle adaptions you can purchase that can easily be added to your parent's vehicles to help with many different needs. Here are some good options.

#### **Entry and Exit Aids**

To help arthritic/mobility challenged seniors with getting into and out of their vehicle, there are a variety of portable support handles you can buy, like the "Emson Car Cane Portable Handle" (\$12), which inserts into the U-shaped striker plate on the doorframe. And the "Standers Car Caddie" (\$13) nylon support handle that hooks around the top of the door window frame.

Another useful product is the "DMI Deluxe Swivel Seat Cushion" (\$22), which is a round portable cushion that turns 360 degrees to help drivers and passengers rotate their body into and out of their vehicle.

### **Enhanced Rear Vision**

To help seniors with limited upper body range of motion, which makes looking over their shoulder to back-up or merge into traffic difficult, there are special mirrors you can add as well as back-up cameras.

For starters, to widen rear visibility, eliminate blind spots and even help with parallel parking, get an oversized rear view mirror like the "Allview Rearview Mirror" (\$50) that clips on to the existing mirror. You should also purchase some "Ampper Blind Spot Mirrors" (\$7.50), which are 2-inch adjustable convex mirrors that stick to the corner of the side view mirrors.

Another helpful device is the "Auto-vox M1W Wireless Backup Camera Kit" (\$110). This comes with a night vision camera that attaches to the rear license plate, and a small monitor that mounts to the dash or windshield. When the vehicle is in reverse, it sends live images wirelessly to the

monitor so you can see what's behind you.

#### **Seat Belt Extenders**

To make buckling up a little easier, there are a variety of seat belt extension products offered by Seat Belt Extender Pros like the "Seat Belt Grabber Handle" (\$8), which is a rubber extension handle that attaches to the seat belt strap to make it easier to reach. And the "7-inch Rigid Seat Belt Extender" (\$20) that fit into the seat belt buckle receiver to add a few inches of length, making them easier to fasten.

#### **Gripping Devices**

If your parents have hand arthritis that makes gripping the steering wheel, turning the ignition key or twisting open the gas cap difficult or painful, consider these products.

The "SEG Direct Steering Wheel Cover" (\$15) that fits over the steering wheel to make it larger and easier to grip. The "Ableware Hole-In-One Key Holder" (\$9), which is a small plastic handle that attaches to the car key to provide additional leverage to turn the key in the ignition or door. And for help at the pump, the "Gas Cap & Oil Cap Opener by Gascapoff" (\$12) is a long handled device that works like a wrench to loosen and tighten the gas cap.

All of these products can be found online at *Amazon.com*. Just type the product name in the search bar to find them.

#### Safety and Security

To help ensure your parents safety, and provide you and them peace of mind, they should also consider an in-car medical alert system like "splitsecnd." Offered through Bay Alarm Medical (BayAlarmMedical.com, \$30/month), this small device plugs into the vehicle's cigarette lighter to provide 24/7 roadside and emergency assistance at the push of a button, automatic crash detection and response, and GPS vehicle location and monitoring capabilities.

# Lee Hamilton Column

### **Politics: We Need It**

Every so often, I jot down a list of the things that discourage me about our country. There's the widespread disregard for our core values of tolerance and mutual respect, for instance. Our declining national optimism. Our relaxed attitude toward fixing our election machinery, overseeing financial institutions, and making sure that our key democratic institutions and processes are working effectively. There's

wage stagnation, income inequality, a high poverty rate, failing infrastructure, inadequate health-care coverage, a dysfunctional Congress. ... You get the idea.

This is not really a list of failings. It's a to-do list. And it pretty much begs the question, if we're not to throw up our hands and give in, how do we make progress on it? Well, I'll tell you: politics.

I suppose most Americans will disagree. How can we depend on people — politicians — whom many hold in utter disregard? And what can we expect from political institutions like legislatures, Congress, the bureaucracy, the political parties, and a rickety electoral system that are widely viewed with suspicion?

The answer, I think, has to be that we should do all we can to encourage and support them to fix these problems, because they're all we've got.

American politics can be an inefficient, noisy, messy ride. But be careful before you condemn it and its practitioners, because alternatives like a chaotic anarchy or the brutal efficiency of a dictatorship are far worse.

In other words, if we're going to attack the problems that concern us, we need politics: otherwise, our government would grind to a halt. We would be without a means of remedying our collective problems. The institutions of politics — the rule of law, elections, city councils, legislatures, Congress — are the way we make operational a government of, by, and for the people. They are how we work together.

At its heart, politics is about searching for a remedy to a problem, and building support behind that remedy. It's the way we try to keep citizens satisfied and strive to meet their hopes, demands and dreams. At its best, politics and political involvement are how we give citizens a feeling of community and an understanding that we're all in this together.

It's our vehicle for expressing shared values and for reconciling the tensions, diversity and differences among us that are bound to arise as we tackle these enormously difficult challenges.

This is not to say that our system is even close to perfect. The list of things we need to fix — from the influence of money on elections and political decision-making to an elections machinery that is crying out for attention and reform — is long. But we need to strike a balance.

As a citizen you have to be critical of your system and ask yourself how to improve it and support reforms that would make it better. Yet I worry that our disdain for politicians and the howling criticism aimed at our democratic institutions in recent years has so undermined confidence in the system that people have lost their trust in their fellow citizens, their elected representatives, and their institutions — in other words, in the very people, organizations, and core values that can get us out of this mess.

If you ask people what they most cherish about our political system, most will say it's the idea of opportunity. For all its fits and starts, its horse-trading and negotiating and raw give and take, politics is also how we try to provide equal rights, civil liberties, and a fair shot at opportunity for all. Sure, we fall short of the ideal. But in a representative democracy, it's the mechanism we possess to try to create a more perfect union

The plain truth is, it doesn't do much good just to talk about the ideals or shared values of America. You also have to try to realize them on the ground, to pull them out of the complicated — and often self-contradictory — mass of popular longings and opinions and translate them into policy and law. For better or worse, politics is how we do this.



### Michigan DNR Fishing Tip— **Eating safe fish in Michigan**

There are many benefits to eating fish, but anglers should be aware that some fish have mercury, dioxin, PCBs or other chemicals in them that can be bad for your health if you eat too many.

The Michigan Department of Health & Human Services' 'Eat Safe Fish Guide' helps you learn about eating safe, local and healthful fish from throughout the state. Their "3Cs" message is simple and easy to remember when it comes to eating safe fish:

- 1. Choose A general rule of thumb is to remember S.A.F.E. Smaller fish are usually a good choice, Avoid large predator fish and bottom-feeders, Fat should be removed, Eat fish that have been broiled or grilled on a rack.
- 2. Clean Learn about cleaning techniques (including trimming as much fat from the fish as possible) to help remove chemicals from the fish.
- 3. Cook Discover cooking techniques that can be used to remove even more chemicals from the fish.

Be informed and check out the 'Eat Safe Fish Guide' to help protect yourself and your family from chemicals that could someday make you sick.





### A Call to Prayer

"I urge you, first of all, to pray for all people. Ask God to help them; intercede on their behalf, and give thanks for them. Pray this way for kings and all who are in authority so that we can live peaceful and quiet lives marked by godliness and dignity. This is good and pleases God our Savior, who wants everyone to be saved and to understand the truth. For, there is one God and one Mediator who can reconcile God and humanity—the man Christ Jesus. He gave his life to purchase freedom for everyone" (1Timothy 2:1-6).

The instructions given to the young Timothy by the apostle Paul are words that all of us who claim the name of Christian can benefit from hearing. Earlier in chapter one, Paul reminded Timothy of his responsibility to be a good leader and teacher in the church. "Timothy my son, here are

my instructions for you, based on the prophetic words spoken about you earlier. May they give you the confidence to fight well in the Lord's battles. Cling tightly to your faith in Christ and always keep your conscience clear" (1 Timothy 1:18-

I want to briefly touch on three thoughts this week. The first is our need to be fervently praying to God for the state of our nation. There are hundreds of scriptures in the Holy Bible that speak to me about our need for prayer, but none of them speaks to me as loudly as 2 Chronicles 7:14. "Then if my people who are called by my name will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, I will hear from heaven and will forgive their sins and restore their land."

The greatest gift we have received from God is forgiveness. When we humble ourselves and go to God with repentant hearts, God, who loves us, forgives us and restores us in our relationship with Him. Without true repentance on our part, there is no forgiveness from God.

Notice that the scripture says, "if my people..." He is not talking about everyone, only the people who claim to follow Him. If we, the people who say we are Christians, would join together in humble repentance and submission to the plan that God has for our lives, and then pray to Him for forgiveness, God promises to forgive us as well as to heal our broken nation.

Please join with me and commit to praying for America, her leaders, her pastors and teachers, and for one another.

We have moved so far away from the divine order of the way God intended us to be, that the only way for us to contribute to the restoration and reconciliation of the relationship that God wants to have with us is through prayer and true repentance. We can no longer stand by and watch as America, repeats the same mistakes that the early Israelites kept making before Christ came into the world.

My second thought is that "God wants everyone to be saved." You and I both know that that is not going to happen. Some people are destined to be lost simply because they refuse to believe the truth and live by the standards that God has laid out for us.

But that does not relieve us of our responsibility, as followers of Jesus, to try and help as many people as we can to come to know the truth.

Paul told Timothy to cling to his faith and fight well the Lord's battles. We must do likewise. We must stay connected to Jesus. How? By spending time in the Word, allowing the Word to transform us into the people that Jesus wants us to be (Romans 12:2).

Jesus says in John 15:5-8: "Yes, I am the vine; you are the branches. Those who remain in me, and I in them, will produce much fruit. For apart from me you can do nothing. Anyone who does not remain in me is thrown away like a useless branch and withers. Such branches are gathered into a pile to be burned. But if you remain in me and my words remain in you, you may ask for anything you want, and it will be granted! When you produce much fruit, you are my true disciples. This brings great glory to my Father.

Which brings me to my third thought.

Everything we do in life should in one way or another bring great glory to God.

Think about this for a moment. We serve the one and only Creator of the entire universe. The God who created everything that exists, existed in the past and will exist in the future. Let that sink in for a minute.

Now think about this temporary life and opportunity we have been given. We have only two options. One is to trust and obey. The other is to drift away and decay.

If we choose to follow Jesus and live by the two great commandments to love God with all of our hearts, minds and strength, as well as to love one another as he loves us, (Matthew 22:37-39) then we have a glorious future ahead of us. Regardless of what happens in this temporary time that we spend in these temporary bodies that were designed to be used and then discarded after a few years, our future is safe and secure. Bought and paid for with the blood of Jesus.

The second option is to turn away from God and choose to live our lives outside of His Will. For that person, there is nothing glorious or joyful to look forward to in eternity.

About four years ago a godly man spoke words of prophecy over me which have proven to be accurate. He told me I was going to be a writer. I didn't give it a lot of thought until months after I started writing this column.

It is clear to me now that God's signature is all over what I am doing. Every time I think about discontinuing my column, God reminds me that I am not doing this because I want to, but because He wants me to. That is enough for me to pick up my computer and start typing.

I don't know if what I write is making a difference or not; what I do know is that I am being obedient to the call God has placed on my life. That's all I need to know. Results are in His department.







### **Newsprint Tariffs Cause Concern**

In matters of life and living, what's of concern or even vital importance for one person or interest group is less so with another person or group. And vice versa.

I had this caution in mind when I refrained from rushing to the editorial page and proclaiming that "the sky is falling" despite learning several weeks ago of a tariff being imposed on Canadian newsprint by the United States government.

The news—which came from the Michigan Press Association—included the warning that this additional cost (as high as 32 percent on certain grades of paper) could cause financial hardship on newspapers since the rising cost to printers would be passed on to them.

Newsprint costs had already been going up, due in part to rising gas prices and more limited supplies, but the stiff tariff threatened a more substantial hike.

J-Ad Graphics in Hastings, the printer I've used for over 30 years to publish the Fowlerville News & Views, gets all of its newsprint from paper mills in Ontario. The same is true for other printers in Michigan and much of the nation.

One of the reasons is close proximity, but also a number of years ago many of the American paper mills abandoned newsprint in favor of more profitable types of paper production.

Fred Jacobs, the CEO of J-Ad Graphics, in a column he wrote last week, noted that "Since 2000, the demand for newsprint in North America has declined by 75 percent. As a result, North American mills have either closed newsprint-producing machines or converted them to higher profit, more financially stable paper products. Those product conversions started in early 2007 when 78 machines across the country were either closed or converted. That eliminated more than 10.175 million tons of newsprint from the industry and increased the pres-



sure to survive on printers and publishers across the country because of reduced availability and subsequent rising prices."

Despite seeing my printing bill go up and realizing more increases would likely be on the way, I initially thought the tariff matter was a 'tempest in the teapot,' that it would soon be resolved, and we'd be back to a more status quo situation. This scenario may indeed happen, but as I've gradually come to realize, it may not. And I realize that damage to the newspaper industry may occur before it does.

So, while I won't claim the sky is in danger of falling, there are some dark clouds looming.

The news of this penalty being put on Canadian newsprint came amid all of the initial hoopla about President Trump threatening stiff tariffs on steel and aluminum, the counter threats made by other countries, and fears of an escalating trade war.

At first, I thought that this product from our northern neighbor had gotten dragged into the mix of products that were being singled out for retaliatory tariffs, like soybeans being a target mentioned by China and Kentucky bourbon listed by the European Union.

However, as I've learned, tariffs can be imposed on certain imports quite apart from the President's recent moves and threats and despite efforts to have 'free trade' between nations. If a company or trade association thinks a competitor or commodity from another country has an unfair advantage due to governmental assistance, they file a complaint. That, it turned out, is what happened with newsprint.

These tariffs on Canadian paper were the result of a complaint filed with the U.S. Department of Commerce by a U.S. manufacturer known as NORPAC. The company, recently purchased by a New York hedge fund, operates a paper mill in the Pacific Northwest and has no other pulp or paper operations in the United States or elsewhere in the world.

NORPAC charged in its complaint that Canadian competitors were "dumping" paper on the U.S. market. NORPAC sells the majority of its inventory on the West Coast.

While far from being a major player in the industry or a supplier of newsprint to printers in the Eastern United States and Midwest, the hedge fund's effort to improve its bottom line by filing the complaint is threatening widespread ramifications.

As the Michigan Press Association stated in a memo to its members, "The longer these tariffs remain in place, the greater the struggle of local newspapers, printers, and related suppliers to remain in business. This is an abuse of trade laws. One company owned by a New York private equity firm is using punitive tariffs to protect its bottom line – and at significant cost to the local newspapers that are the foundation of an informed citizenry and healthy democracy.

"The tariffs threaten hundreds of thousands of jobs in journalism, publishing, printing and other sectors," the memo

There is a due process involved in trying to end the tariff and that's unfolding.

On July 17, the International Trade Commission will hear testimony on the preliminary tariffs. Newspaper trade organizations, like the Michigan Press Association, are asking members of Congress to testify or submit comments for this hearing, and describe the impact of these tariffs on their local newspapers and jobs at their districts and states.

In addition, last week the Secretary of Commerce (who has an important and distinct role in the newsprint case) expressed interest in receiving information from newspapers on the impact of the tariffs on their businesses.

Support to reverse the tariff is being sought as well from business groups, labor unions, chambers of commerce, and state and national political leaders.

All of this is of obvious concern and vital importance to printers and publications, but for many others the issue might be "So what? So you have to pay more for the product?"

Well, that's only part of the equation. Granted, my print bill has been nudging up during the past several weeks and, if the trend continues, I'll need to make adjustments. More revenues or fewer expenses are the two main choices.

But that's not my biggest worry.

What's happening is that the 'big' printers, including large newspaper chains, seeing this trend of price increases, have bought up available stock and locked in future orders at current prices. This has created supply shortages. These companies have the cash flow and warehouse space to do this. The smaller printers, including the firm that produces my newspaper, do what they can, but mainly they rely on calling in an order and having it shipped to their respective plants.

Much like auto suppliers not wishing to tie up money on inventory and having to store it, the printers have historically and by necessity operated on their version of "just in time delivery."

But that's only part of their worry—and now mine. The Canadian newsprint suppliers, in dealing with the tariff along with the disruption of the normal supply routine, may place printers on an allocated basis. In other words there might be only so much newsprint to go around.

This potential lack of supply; the fact that one week there

might not be enough newsprint to put out the issue, or that it might have to be reduced in size is what alarms me if events spiral out-of-control.

All of this—the actual and potential—is yet another reminder that we live in an interconnected world, with all kinds of causes-and-effects and unforeseen consequences. Through no fault of my own, through no fault of my fellow newspaper publishers, and through no fault of the printers who play a key role in our business, I and they are being threatened and financially hurt by the hedge fund that filed a complaint and the governmental decision to impose a tariff.

Again, I realize that what is a priority to me might not have the same significance to others. Each of us has our own list of worries and priorities.

While I hope the tariff on newsprint is lifted in the near future and my fear of a paper shortage does not materialize, what's now happening to my industry can and might happen to others. Trade wars, just like the armed conflicts, have their winners and losers, but they can also cause collateral damage, leaving innocent victims in their wake.

For those victims, the sky really is falling.

# **Newsprint Tariffs: Bad for Jobs and Democracy**

The U.S. Commerce Department has added anti-dumping duties of up to 32 percent on newsprint and some other paper products from Canada. According to the agency these products benefit from unfair Canadian government subsidies. Most newspaper publishers across the country disagree.

The newly imposed tariff on newsprint is a direct threat to a cornerstone of democracy. Our congressional delegation can help stop this threat.

Newspapers still get a large share of their revenue from their print product. Newspapers buy tons of newsprint every year, and it is a significant portion of their expenses. The tariff imposed by the Department of Congress on Canadian newsprint has cut deeply into revenues and for many community newspapers, it could be an unnecessary threat to survival.

The Michigan Press Association represents over 280 newspapers in our great state and we fear this tariff is a threat to democracy in the communities they serve.

A government based on democracy requires a knowledgeable citizenry. This tariff will result in more cuts in newsrooms that are gamely doing their best with far less in the way of resources than they once had. Resources that let citizens know what their government is doing on all levels.

This tariff was based on the complaint of one newsprint company in Washington state. It will result in the loss of jobs across the country.

General President of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, James P. Hoffa states that the Teamsters oppose this tariff because of "the potential adverse effect to small and medium sized publications throughout the country and their workers."

We ask the public to consider the damage to their communities if there is no watchdog newspaper to report to them. Please contact your member of Congress and urge them to let the ITC know this is a bad tariff by July 17, 2018. Also ask them to support The Print Act.
